Roncalli senior Elizabeth Eads' high-energy start in two matches Saturday launched the Rebels to their second consecutive Marion County volleyball championship at Lawrence North.

The 5-10 middle blocker opened matches against Perry Meridian in the semifinal and Brebeuf Jesuit in the title match with the Rebels' first kills. She registered 25 kills and six blocks for the day.

Classmate/outside hitter Grace Hegwood also dominated up front with 15 kills against the Falcons and 14 against Brebeuf.

The rangy and agile duo helped No. 20 Roncalli defeat the rival Falcons 25-17, 25-21, 25-17 and No. 19 Brebeuf 25-17, 28-26, 25-19 for the championship.

"I like to get really excited, play with a big smile and with high energy," Eads said. "We play together as a team, not as individuals; everyone is involved, plays with confidence and focuses on the game."

Each win for the Rebels represented a total team effort Saturday for the school's eighth sectional title.

Junior setter Elizabeth Origer had 82 assists and freshman libero Emma Halter had 56 digs for the day.

Senior Betsy Crosley had seven kills against Brebeuf with three consecutive kills midway in the third set. Senior Miranda Wilson kept up the intensity of the Rebels' play at the net. Roncalli's back row featured Halter, Taylor Kehoe, Grace Imer and

Retired railroader wins \$50,000

Jim Gibson was working with his tools when he needed a break, so he decided to take his Powerball ticket to the store to check if it was a winner.

"I went into the store I normally go to, I scanned it and it said, 'You're a winner,'" Gibson recalled while claiming his \$50,000 Powerball prize at Hoosier Lottery headquarters.

Since the scanner didn't tell him how much he won he took it to the cashier to check, who said, "Do not lose this ticket. I don't know what you've won, but it's serious."

Gibson, who retired from Amtrak after 40 years, had matched four numbers and the Powerball in the Sept. 12 drawing for \$50,000.

He plays Powerball each week, picking one set of numbers and buying four Quick Picks, one of which was the winner. He purchased the winning ticket at BG31, 3131 E. Troy Ave., Beech Grove.

He claimed the prize with his wife, Vicki, after they had told their three adult children about the win.

"They didn't believe us at first," Vicki said.

The couple intend to give 10 percent of their winnings to their church. They had a trip to Disney already planned, so some of the money will go toward the trip. Most of the rest, they said, will be used for normal living expenses.

Career exploration and preparation are critical parts of the learning process. When students learn at an early age that there are boundless professional opportunities available to them, they can begin to dream big.

They can try activities they may have never considered before. They can join clubs to learn more about a newfound interest. They can look for job shadow opportunities to get an up-close look at what the profession might look like. They can begin this exploration well before they embark on their senior year. Partnerships from community supporters like IUPUI make this hands-on approach possible.

Educators at Perry Meridian High School have teamed with IUPUI to supplement curriculum in unique ways. Indiana University School of Nursing students spend Wednesdays with Stephanie Kim's English learners class and Kim Stafford's anatomy class.

It is truly a learning opportunity for our students, as well as the IUPUI students, who are enrolled in a healthy populations practicum course. The course requires aspiring nurses to go into neighborhoods to not only teach the community about the importance of making healthy lifestyle choices, but also how to incorporate healthy choices into their daily routines. The nursing students are responsible for identifying strengths and needs within the community and then partnering with the community to implement a health promotion activity.

In Mrs. Kim's class, nursing students teach about nutrition – specifically increasing the amount of fruits and vegetables consumed each day, in addition to reducing the amount of added fat, sodium and sugar. The Perry Meridian students were treated to a health fair where they learned about healthy alternatives to some of their favorite snacks. The nursing school partnered with the nutrition services team from the Marion County Public Health Department, which helped students make nutrient-rich green smoothies trail mix.

In Mrs. Stafford's room, nursing students supplemented the anatomy class's content, including brain health and function. Nursing students were also able to integrate their lessons into our Project Lead the Way curriculum, which is designed for students who are interested in studying health sciences in the future.

This partnership is beneficial not only for the nursing and Perry students but also to the Perry Township community. While nursing students are improving their communication, assessment and civic leadership skills, our students are learning how to live healthier lives and build a foundation to possibly pursue a career in health-related professions. The information our students receive will potentially be shared with their families and friends, who might also begin to incorporate healthy choices into their lives.





Fifty Years Ago This Week — 1968
John Deubelbeiss, Lee Musick, Debbie Welsh, Tommy Simpson, Lori Cox, Tom Davis and Ruth Ellen Stegemiller, all students at the Wotring Accordion Studio, competed in Indy Parks' talent contest.

A five-room house with a basement at 1427 Charles St. was listed for \$3,750.

Home Beverage, 418 E. Troy Ave., charged 25 cents to deliver beer and liquor. All orders had to be at least \$4.

Five 12-ounce cans of corn cost \$1 at Millers Regal Market, 215 Terrace Ave., where a large stalk of celery was 15 cents and a pound of cottage cheese cost 29 cents.

Forty Years Ago This Week — 1978
Ed Coonfield, owner of Ed's Auto Radio, 3301 Madison Ave., and Roy Walker, owner of Big R CB Shop, 4376 Madison, pooled their resources to open a van customizing shop at 3311 S. East St.

Tap dancers Rosemarie Milto and Jill Fortuna, students of Beverly Smithley, were winning a number of contests.

Every Thursday and Saturday night was ladies night at Doc Gainey's Restaurant & Pub, 3652 S. Meridian St., where drinks were half-price for women. Monday's special was a 21-piece shrimp dinner for \$1.75.

Thirty Years Ago This Week — 1988

Southport High School's football team defeated Perry Meridian 17-14 on Cooley Smith's field goal to start the fourth quarter. The Falcons had a chance to tie the game with 26 seconds remaining, but their field goal attempt was no good.

Twenty Years Ago This Week — 1998



A ceremony honoring the presence of German greenhouse growers on the Southside since the mid-1850s culminated in the unveiling of a historic marker at Bluff Park, 555 W. Hanna Ave. The plaque paid homage to the growers, who at one time occupied what was believed to be the largest concentration of greenhouses in the country. The program was attended by more than 130 people, including growers Fred Hoeltke, Chuck Hafer, Charlie Jordan, Gus Wiegman, Paul Auferderheide, Fred Brune, Carl Hohlt and Bob Roehling.

Joshua Lyon, son of Barbara and William Lyon and a freshman at Center Grove High School, attained the highest honor in Boys Scouts — the rank of Eagle Scout. His service project entailed organizing a linen drive for the Holy Family Shelter and painting 12 of the facility's guest rooms.

Former IndyCar owners save karting track

Whiteland Raceway Park's new owners, husband and wife Andy O'Gara and Sarah Fisher, have not wasted time in making improvements to the outdoor karting track and facilities.

O'Gara, a Beech Grove native, and Fisher, who live in Franklin Township, bought the track with Wink Hartman, a Midwest oil company owner, last month and held the first practice for karting enthusiast Saturday and Sunday. They bought the track from longtime Mike Swails on short notice after learning that it would be torn down.

The facility features a nine-turn road course with a high-banked wall and oval where Andy and younger brother Kyle O'Gara, a developmental driver for Sarah Fisher Racing, began racing karts owned by father John O'Gara, former IndyCar team manager.

"When Andy called to tell me that Mike had offered us the purchase of WRP, we immediately agreed to work through the details of the renovation effort," Fisher stated in a news release.

The renovation began immediately with ridding the grounds of weeds, moving the property and resealing the oval and road course and entrance.

Open practices will be from 10 a.m.-10 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m.-8 p.m. the next two Sundays.

Fisher and Hartman formerly owned Sarah Fisher Hartman Racing in the Verizon IndyCar Series from 2008-14.

The first racing program under new ownership is Saturday, Oct. 13, for karts with practice at 4 p.m. and racing at 6 p.m. The owners are planning a vintage midget car and IndyCar displays, autographs with IndyCar drivers and a \$1,000 kart feature winner's prize. They are hopeful of rescheduling another event Oct. 20 or Nov. 3.

"First and foremost, please know that our ultimate goal is to restore Whiteland Raceway Park to its former glory," the new owners said in a joint statement. "We want to preserve the history and heritage of WRP while bringing new life to the facility."

A grand opening will be held in 2019 with plans for quarter-midget racing on the oval and to have rental karts.

Upgrading rest rooms and lighting is a priority. Future improvements also call for a new banked wall, repairs to fences, bleachers and flag stand, new picnic tables, parking lot expansion, new electronic timing system and in-ground roll-on kart scaling system plus sales of kart apparel and parts.

The facility opened in 1958 and is considered the oldest kart track in the United States. It is located at 654 N. Front St., between Tracy and Whiteland roads, in Whiteland.

O'Gara and Fisher also own Speedway Indoor Karting. For updates visit www.racewrp.com or call 317-800-1648.


