'We did it!"

Lutheran defenseman Ethan Tran screamed those words running off the soccer field at Seymour after the Saints quaranteed the Class A team a first-time trip to the IHSAA state championship game Friday at 8 p.m. at Fishers High School.

The underdog Saints ex-ploded for the only goal scored by sophomore Sean Moore only 49 seconds into the second period to defeat Jac-Cen-Del for a raindrenched 1A Seymour Semistate championship.

After a tense first-period scoreless deadlock, Lutheran coach Ryan Baglow encouraged his team to "attack, attack" in the second period.

And that's exactly what the Saints did. They moved the first possession of the period closer and closer to the goal. In close quarters on the left side near the goal, junior Fred Hamer had moved the ball to Moore

"I was in the right place at the right time," said Moore of his second game-winner during the IHSAA playoffs. "My mindset was to shoot go for the open spot. I saw their goalie on the left side; I shot to the right side so he couldn't get to the ball.

The district is excited to announce that the academy has been awarded a portion of a \$100,000 grant from Early Learning Indiana (ELI) to help preschool students transition to kindergarten. For the second year in a row, representatives from ELI presented the academy with \$10,000 from the Strong Start for Kindergarten program. The initiative encourages family engagement and strengthens the experience between pre-K and K-12, setting the stage for

academic success and emotional growth. Recipients were specifically chosen because of their innovative practices that engage families. This year, academy teachers plan to host parent-education sessions to share tips about supporting students in kindergarten and beyond. Establishing connections with families early will allow our teachers to build and maintain relationships that will hopefully last for years to come. It also encourages families to give

thoughtful feedback about the preschool's approach to education and assessments. Educators will also offer social-emotional training, as well as connect families, who are in need, to community resources. Administrators believe students are more likely to take responsibility for their learning when their parent or caretaker takes an active role in monitoring aca-

demic performance. During the 2018-19 school year, the academy received a \$10,000 portion of ELI's grant. With that award, the preschool instituted a program that allowed students to check out books to be read at home with their families. Students were also allowed to take home games related to books to help them work on literacy at home.

The academy is ranked as a Level 4 provider by Paths to QUAL ITY™, Indiana's statewide rating system for early care and education programs. We take incredible pride in the education our preschool staff provides. Our teachers are licensed and held to the same standards as elementary and secondary educators across the district. They receive professional development training and regular teacher evaluations.





## Scare crow or snowman?

I have always enjoyed Halloween.

Growing up, my parents would take me trick-or-treating to a few of our neighbor's homes. Later when my sister was old enough to dress up, she would go with us.

I remember a fancy Halloween party hosted by my mother for a sorority when I was a boy. I was to be on a front-porch bench in a kneeling position and covered with a white sheet with holes that allowed me to see her guests as they arrived. When I made some small movements as they approached, some of the guests became excited.

Many Halloweens later, I recall that Lyn and I were to help our daughter on Halloween night. We were to greet trick-or-treaters at the door and hand out candy to allow them to roam the neighborhood with their boys. At that point, I thought Lyn could give out the candy and I would put together a Halloween costume for myself. I would dress up in a scarecrow costume with oversized clothing, a fullbrimmed hat, straw coming out of my sleeves and pants legs and big boots on the wrong feet. I decided to sit slumped over in a lawn chair in the front yard, but

I adjusted my hat so I could see. Passer-byes couldn't see my face. I waited until it was totally dark. I didn't try to scare the younger kids as they walked past me to see Lyn at the front door. The lawn chair was closer to where parents would stand and watch their kids. When the adults would stare at me, I would make slight movements to give them a fright. I was having a blast. Soon I noticed a couple of teen-aged girls not in costume going down the street walking and talking to each other. Suddenly one of

the girls, running fast and laughing, started toward me. I realized that she was going to leap and land on my lap. She jumped but I moved frantically, and she wound up landing a few feet away from me. She then turned and yelled very loudly: "Bad snowman, bad snowman." And then she and her friend ran quickly down the street and out of When Lyn and I were finishing up that very enjoyable Halloween,

I looked up and noticed those same girls walking back to the front yard. They seemed very skeptical about getting near to us. At that point, I was standing and visiting with some family and neighbors. We waved at the girls and invited them to join us.

The first question, I asked for the teenager who jumped in the air, "Why did you call me a snowman?"

She said she was so rattled that she couldn't think of the words

We stood in the front yard and laughed for a while. It was a great way to end a very enjoyable Halloween.

## Old CSX property to be redeveloped in Beech Grove

Beech Grove is finally on the move with the first phase of development of all 115 acres at the old CSX rail property.

The Brownfield-related property was sold in early July to the Indianapolis-based Real Estate Recover Capital (RERC) at Emerson Avenue and Subway Drive in Beech Grove

On Oct. 22, Beech Grove Mayor Dennis Buckley announced that Milestone Contractors LP will relocate its headquarters from South Belmont Avenue to 30 acres on the newly acquired

Buckley foresees the remainder of the property that had been vacant for years to be utilized as an industrial/commercial site that is already zoned industrial and has significant rail access.

"Companies want to invest in Beech Grove," Buckley said in an interview with The Southsider Voice. "This opens the door for that area. Milestone will bring 110 existing jobs here and 25 new

Milestone expects to spend \$11 million to build its new headguarters and maintenance hub that includes a 25,000-sqare-foot office and 52,000 square foot garage. Construction is expected to begin late this year and be finished in 2021

The Metropolitan Development Commission is expected to

okay a five-year tax abatement that Beech Grove Council supports at its Nov. 6 meeting.

Buckley explained that it ap-

plies only to future buildings and not property or equipment. He added that the property will go on the property tax roles in 2020 and that the previous owners had not paid any taxes on the undeveloped property.

With Milestone and Amazon XI developments in Beech Grove, Buckley sees a continued rise in redevelopment in the municipality.

Amazon XL is developing property at 6057 Churchman Bypass into a 5,000 square foot building for large item deliveries that also will bring more jobs to Beech Grove.

Buckley said that construc-tion on the Churchman Bypass roundabout will assist in traffic movement in the area of Amazon XL. Work is to begin next spring on a \$1.7 million roundabout at Arlington Avenue and Churchman A roundabout also is planned

at Arlington and Hanna avenues. Due to recent traffic accidents at Victory Drive and Emerson Avenue, Buckley said that INDOT is now interested in improvements at that intersection.

Looking at enhancing Beech Grove, Buckley emphasized that the development of walking trails that connect throughout the city will be an amenity that homebuy-

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

Pasch was on target because it doesn't get any more fundamental or physical than the Saints domination of Sheridan, 62-14.

Led by Indiana's most prolific small-school runner Marcus McFadden, the Saints racked up nine touchdowns and 485 yards total offense. McFadden scored four TDs that accounted for 174 yards of his game-high 248 yards on the ground.

Lutheran dominated Sheridan in several ways: \*485 yards total offense.

\*Scoring touchdowns of 73, 78, 42, 42 and 37 yards on first plays from scrimmage.

\*Running their first third- and fourth-down plays early in the third

\*Allowed Sheridan only two first downs in the first half.

And the Saints triumph came against legendary coach Bud Wright, who has guided Sheridan to nine state championships.

The Saints were simply too fast and too physical for the host Black-

Lutheran scored on its fourth play with McFadden from the one-yard

The Saints second TD was a game-changer. Sheridan attempted a behind-the-line of scrimmage pass that fell short of the receiver. Sophomore d-back Montassi Clay scooped up the football from the 30 and scampered a short distance for a 14-0 lead with seven minutes left in the first half.

The Saints scored five more times in the first half, capped by a short pass from Jalen Elliott to Clay, who turned the play into a 42-yard TD for a 49-14 lead

At Roncalli, the host Rebels dominated winless Frankfort by piling up 329 yards total offense and holding the Hot Dogs to only 98 yards. Baron Huebler ran for two TDs and 136 yards. Aiden Leffler and Caden Gore threw one TD apiece.

Frankfort's longest gain was eight yards against the Rebels. At Madison, Greenwood pounded host Madison as quarterback Oliver Rau completed only four passes with two aerials going for TDs.

With eight starters out with injuries, the Woodmen led 42-0 at the half. Each of the three games wound up with a running clock during the second half under first-year IHSAA rules.



At Morristown, Lutheran fell to Bloomfield in the 1A regional




