Mia Prusiecki found herself engaged in a close battle with Northridge senior Jiselle Miller as they competed in the preliminary and semifinal rounds of Saturday's IHSAA State Championship diving finals in the Indiana University Natatorium on the campus of IUPUI.

After the first eight dives, and going into the final three attempts, the Center Grove sophomore had Miller just where she wanted her more than two points ahead of Prusiecki. "I didn't want

to go to the finals in first," Prusiecki said. "Last year, I was first and went down. So I didn't want to be in first this year.'

Until the event was over. When the

competition concluded, Prusiecki had earned her championship, outpointing Miller 524.00 to 519.45.

Another Northridge senior, Kaitlin Simons, was third at 501.75. Franklin Central junior Devynn Bishop took fifth with 481.55 points.

Prusiecki and Miller had not battled since the 2021 state finals when Prusiecki was the runner-up to Fishers senior Morgan Casey, but the Trojan sophomore was surprised with her competitor's early success Saturday

"I was like surprised, but Jiselle is a good diver," Prusiecki said.

The two remained close. Although Prusiecki scored 65.80 points on her 10th dive, an inward two somersaults from the tuck position, Miller still led by four points That brou

1933: David O. Selznik was made the new vice-president of MGM studios on this day. He also played the role of producer for MGM. He replaced a person commonly known as RKO. who had returned to the company with whom he (RKO) had launched his

1937: Wallace H. Carothers, a research chemist for Du Pont, received a patent for nylon.

1938: It was reported on this day that heavy rainfall occurred the evening before. Even though Texas is generally a warmer drier state than others. locals were not prepared for it. Instead they expected bitter winter temperatures. The concern about this rainfall was that colder weather was predicted for later in the week. This cold weather would then cause a complete freeze-over and West Texas would be covered with ice.

**1942:** The song "Jersey Bounce" is recorded by Shep Fields and his orchestra. This piece becomes one of the defining numbers of the big band musical era.

1968: The first 911 emergency telephone system is inaugurated in Haleyville, Ala., but due to problems with telephone service boundaries and electromechanical switching equipment which could not recognize the 911 number, it is not until the mid 1980s that 911 works countrywide.

# The Voice announces Top 10 stories of 2021 and prize winners

The fatal shooting of Beech Grove's Samaria Blackwell, who was among eight victims killed in a mass shooting at a FedEx facility, is the 2021 Top Story of the Year, according to readers of The Southsider Voice who submitted ballots

Blackwell, 19, who desired to become a police officer, had worked at the farwestside facility for only a few months before the shooting on April 14. She was later named as an honorary Southport police officer at the dedication of the "buddy bench" in front of Southport Elementary School later in the year.

Our readers also acknowledged the passing of beloved coach and educator Ray Schultz and legendary motorsports reporter Robin Miller among the top five stories of 2021

#### **Readers submitted a near**record number of ballots and marked nine of the 21 stories with first-place votes. The results:

7. New and spacious West Perry Library opens as a much-needed second Indy Public Library branch in Perry Township.

8. Final phase of Madison Ave. reconstruction and modernization in Greenwood open to motorists.

9. Fire destroys landmark grain elevator on Main Street in Greenwood near CSX railroad tracks.

10. Dedication of a "buddy bench" at Southport Elementary School memorializes fallen police Lt. Aaron Allan and IMPD's Breann Leath and longtime community volunteer Annie Singleton. Throughout 2021, the Southside

I understand that as I am starting a new adventure, Mom and Dad will probably be struggling with the absence of our daily routine. We are really going to miss each other.





What's better than a Perry Township wrestler making it all the way to state? Six Perry Township Schools wrestlers making it all the way to state! The competition is this weekend and Perry Meridian and

Southport wrestlers are ready to solidify some more wins. Southport Senior Nate Smith has earned his way to the top. He is currently undefeated, with a 47-0 record after dominating last weekend's Indiana High School Athletic Competition (IHSAA) Semi-State Championships

"I really can't ask for much better. I won county, conference, regionals, sectionals...and then just recently, I broke the all-time and season record, said Smith.

At Perry High, junior Toby Billerman is also making a name for himself.

"I did a lot of tournaments after the season last year. I went to Sophomore Nationals. I placed eighth there in the nation," said Billerman. What do Nate

and Toby have in common. well, besides the obvious? Both boys are headed to state and both are strong contenders for titles.

"Get past the opponent. If I wrestle my best, I think no one can

beat me," said Billerman.

Smith added, "I think I'm just as good as anyone else in the state." At Perry, head coach Matt Schoettle is sending five boys altogether to the finals.

Perry Meridian's Toby Billerman captures the

regional; one of five Falcons to reach state finals.

'We've coached these kids, some since they were 4-5 years old. Now watching them as juniors, try to reach their goals, I don't think there's anything better in coaching," said Schoettle.

On the Southport side, head wrestling coach Nick Skinner is confident heading to the finals.

"I'll teach them things that work for me. I have other coaches that teach them things that work for them. I ask the kids to pick up what they think works," said Skinner.

Which seems to be working. Still, with the stakes so high, there's a little apprehension.

"It's definitely in the back of my mind that it could be over. One

The musical tells the story of a teen who moves from his preteen home in New York City to a sleepy Hoosier town after his parents' divorce. The rock score is by Tony Award winning composer James Robert Brown.

The new season also features "A Christmas Story: The Musical," in December. The musical brings a different and entertaining dimension to the popular movie set in the 1940s. The versatile score ranges from ballads to full-ensemble numbers.

The new season in Winter and Spring 2023 also includes "Always a Bridesmaid" in January-Februrary, "Are You Being Served" in Spring, and 'The Great American Trailer Park Musical' in early Summer

All 49th season productions are contingent upon licensing availability.

The current 48th season (2021-2022) ended the production of "Good People," a comedy that takes place in Southie, a Boston neighborhood where a night on the town means bingo. The lead actors were Molly Bellner (Margaret), Jeremy Tuterow (Mike), Francie Mitchaner (Jean), and Susan Hill (Dottie).

"Fly Babies," a drama where history takes off, unfolds on stage April 1-10. This play is about five young American women who are qualified pilots in the newly-created Women Airforce Service pilots (WASPs), each from different backgrounds.

The next musical production will be 'Little Women," June 3-19. Auditions were held recently at the playhouse for the Broadway musical that is locally produced by Gloria Bray, directed by Cathy Cutshall, and musical director Emily Gaddy.

Buck Creek Players began in 1973 when the Franklin Township Civic League and local residents formed a committee to present performing arts. They performed in elementary schools and high schools before moving into their first home in a historic church on Acton Road.

In 2001, they moved into its current home. With increased capacity to 130 patrons, the space is intimate and there's not a bad seat in the house

to win. I just wanted to do my best. That's all I came

here for. I'm happy.' Unlike some coaches, who are in constant conversation and interaction with their divers, Center Grove diving coach Brian Glover was available to Prusiecki, but mostly watched her perform.

"At this point in the season, it's not what I'm going to do, but what Mia is going to do," he explained

He figured the competition would go all the way to the finale.

"It was going to come down to the last dive," Glover said. "The 11th dive - who can land it best?

"The excitement. the adrenaline and the state competition, it really drives you to do well. She knows how to bring it. I'm really glad we pulled it out." At first glance, it

appeared Prusiecki was in position to make a run at the state record of 563.65 points, established in 2015 by Brooke Schultz of Hamilton Heights.

After scoring 492.95 points to win the Center Grove sectional meet. Prusiecki amassed 572.95 points in the Jasper diving regional, which was moved from Bloomington South because of limited spectator space there. But more than one coach at the state meet noted that the Jasper scores were inflated.

Indian Creek sophomore Ella Taylor was the Jasper runnerup at 486.05, but she was knocked out of Saturday's preliminaries when a leg buckled as she launched a dive. After scraping the board with her head, she hit it with a shoulder and did not finish the competition.

# **Coach Weems, GCA bow out** of girls' basketball playoffs

Ten years ago, all Alan Weems wanted to do was to make a difference when he became the head girls basketball coach at Greenwood Christian Academy.

Mission accomplished.

When he arrived at GCA after three years at Whiteland, the Cougars relatively new program had won only two sectional games in five years. Weems retires as GCA's coach with nine winning seasons, nine seasons with 13 wins or more, four consecutive sectional each and four regional championships plus four Final Four appearances.

Weems' 10 year run at GCA ended Saturday in the first game of the 1A Southwestern Regional when Bethesda Christian defeated the Cougars, 54-42.

"I would like to hope that at some point in time, maybe I made a difference and these kids made a difference," Weems said outside the locker room Saturday. "To say, you made a difference; it doesn't get any better than that."

Attending a Biblical-centered school. the student-athletes that he coached also made a difference.

"Obviously that also means, thinking of others," Weems said. "We wanted to be a program that served, that doesn't take, and they did a good job of that over 10 years. We had some outstanding kids, and I'm grateful for that."

Against Bethesda Christian, the Cougars led only once, 2-0 on Dani Simon's close-in basket and later tied it at 8-8 on leading scorer Ellie Bigelow's shot. The Cougars were doomed by poor shooting in the first half (6 of 27 field goals, 4 of 12 free throws) and trailed 29-16. They trailed by 15 points twice in the second half before trimming the Patriots lead to 44-38 on Bigelow's eight-second five-point spurt with 1:45 left.

The Cougars were unable to get any closer. During a time out with 32.5 seconds left, GCA realized the outcome as senior Dory O'Dell and junior Laura Peterson hugged each other.

"We struggled all day," Weems observed. "We couldn't buy a basket and the free throw line was a problem in the first half. Our kids weren't going to give in; they kept battling and battling.

Bigelow led the Cougars with 20 points with eight points from Simon. Bethesda junior Kenzie Fulks topped all scorers with 25 points.

He leaves the girls basketball program with a stronger foundation

"I'm proud of where the program is at, but I'll be more excited to see where it goes from here," said Weems, an 18-year


