# **GCA** reaches Final Four

A miracle finish and a gritty performance Saturday propelled Greenwood Christian Academy's girls' basketball team to the IHSAA tournament Final Four.

The determined Cougars came from behind against different Class A opponents to capture the program's first regional championship at Southwestern (Shelby County)

High School.

In their first game, the Cougars trailed Jac-Cen-Del by 11 points late in the third quarter but miraculously outscored the Eagles, 24-3, for a 61-49 win.

Then in the nightcap, gritty GCA with two players in foul trouble answered every threat by North Central in a tense second half and pulled away for a 74-65 triumph.

Afterward, GCA's lone senior Alexis Mead explained the theme of the day: "We did not want to go home.

Simply put, the Cougars reached deep within to keep this historymaking ride alive Saturday.

They survived with two comebacks and will play No. 1 Loogootee (25-2) at 4 p.m. Saturday in the Jasper Semistate. An historic win Saturday sends the No. 8 Cougars to

# **Retired WWII veteran helps** Westwood students read

Westwood Elementary School third-grader Ramon Harris sits down at a table in the school library, opens a book and begins to

With an infectious smile, he stops before turning the first page and puts on an oversize white-and-red hat. Harris, who was a newcomer at the westside Greenwood school this year, is not sitting alone.

The hat belongs to retired World War II veteran Tom Foster, who has lived on the Southside for most of his life. Foster looks at Ramon and they look at the book, "Fly Guy and the Frankenfly." Ramon starts reading. Foster occasionally interrupts him and makes sure he knows how to spell some of the words.

Foster, 95, is in his 16th year as a volunteer mentor at Westwood where he helps youngsters read. He volunteered through

Butler Scholarships at PMHS

Education excellence is our goal for every student who enrolls in Perry Schools Our graduation rate is 94 percent, and we are committed to increasing that number as we invest in the success of every child.

It is our hope that, upon graduation, every student will pursue a plan: postsecondary education, employment, or military enlistment. We strive to send educated, capable young adults into the world regardless of the path they choose. As we approach this year's commencement, it's truly a joy to see our students' plans starting to

To continue their dream of a college education, Perry Meridian High School seniors Victor Barona and Amy Dilley were surprised with full academic scholarships to Butler University from its assistant director of admissions Whitney Ramsey and mascot Blue.

Ramsey surprised each student, as they sat in their classrooms, with the big news. Shocked, the scholars learned of their good fortune with the cheers of classmates, teachers, parents, and administrators. They also received the approval of Blue who wagged his tail with ap-

Barona is the recipient of the Dr. John Morton-Finney Leadership Scholarship, whose namesake was an alumnus of Butler and earned 11 degrees and practiced law for 53 years. He retired two years before his death at the age of 108, making him the oldest practicing attorney in Indiana. Dr. Morton-Finney believed in education and served the Indianapolis Public School system for 47 years as a teacher and administrator. Notably, he was also the oldest living member of the World War I Army unit of black soldiers known as the Buffalo Soldiers.

While academic performance is considered, the scholarship is awarded to students who demonstrate an active leadership role to promote diversity and inclusion through high school and community activities. They must also engage in professional development opportunities. Barona plans to study accounting at Butler's Lacy School of Business. He is one of only five students, out of nearly 800 applicants, to receive the Leadership Scholarship.

Dilley's scholarship surprise came in her calculus class. She received the Butler Tuition Guarantee, which provides full tuition each year when combined with all federal, state, and University scholarships and grants. It's available to Marion County students who have a solid academic record, as well as participation in high school extracurricular activities and community service projects. Dilley also plans to study business at Butler's Lacy School. Dilley is one of 10 students to receive the award

over 11 years. A couple of weeks ago on a visit, we started down the main hallway and noticed a wall poster in recognition of a resident of the month.


One of the

and staff filled the room with laughter.



GCA pulled away on a 14-4 run that was capped by Reed's two free throws

The Cougars never panicked in either game.

Reed had 26 points and 12 rebounds in the title game, her second double-double of the day. Savvanah Frye added 12 and Mead 10. O'Dell wound up with eight points with Bigelow and Grider, each scoring six points as the trio of undergraduates showed maturity under pressure in the nightcap.

The Cougars dominated the boards against North Central in the second half and connected on 20 free throws on 24 tries in the game. GCA's basketball program began with partial programs in 2002-2003 and played its first full season two years later.

They have six straight winning seasons (101-56) with 15-year coach Alan Weems and they have a program record 23 wins this season. The Cougars are riding a 13-game winning streak. Last year, they reached the regional championship game before bowing to University.

Mead understands how the expectations have grown. "My sophomore year, all we wanted was the sectional," said Mead who has scored more than 1,000 points in her career. "We just kept building and now we have a regional championship."

Along the way, the Cougars' confidence has grown, too.

"There's not a team in the state we can't play with," Frye said. In the 4A regional at Columbus North, Franklin Central led East Central 23-18 at the half. Alexus Mobley's 3-point shot put the Flashes ahead, 26-20, then the Trojans shut down FC 12-0 for the next six min-

utes. The Flashes came no closer than six points in the fourth quarter. Rachel Loobie, an Indiana All-Star candidate, finished with 22 points. The Flashes improved from only two wins last year to 15-13 and their first sectional title since 2014 this season.

Foster recalled that Ramon was timid at first; somewhat because he was a new student this school year at Westwood. He's made new

friends and enjoys his new surroundings. "Sometimes I read to them, but mostly they read to me," Foster recalled. "We go over the alphabet; but I follow what the teacher wants done 100 percent.

Foster is also at home at the school and throughout the Southside. He and his late wife, Iva, have one son, Ronald, and two granddaughters. His wife died in 2008. He is a retiree of Decca Records, packaging department, and Mayflower Transit, where he audited invoices from
