Fab Five key to IUPUI softball

The Southside's Fab Five represents the future success of softball at the Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis.

The players – Delaney Turner, Maddie Keeley and Mandy Dallas from Center Grove High School's 2015 4A state championship team, Megan Overton from Greenwood and Delaney Thompson from Franklin Central – are among a combined 10 freshmen/sophomores with the Jaguars, who have only two seniors and four juniors.

Turner, an outfielder converted to first base, is the only sophomore among the five; she had 20 hits and scored 10 times this season.

Keeley, an outfielder, played in 36 games before suffering a bone chip in her ankle. She is to undergo surgery next week. She hit .245 and was successful in stealing base 13 of 14 times.

Dallas capped IUPUI's home season Saturday with a grand slam in the first inning in the Jags' 9-2 senior day win over Detroit Mercy. She hit .312 with 39 hits, 33 RBIs and a team-high 10 home runs.

Thompson had a great college freshman year, hitting .275 (.325 in Summit League games) and being named to the league's all-tourney team. She was a two-time All-State softball player for coach Kathy Stricker at Franklin Central.

Overton helped lead Greenwood to three straight Mid-State titles and back-to-back Johnson County championships. She played for Boston College as a freshman, appearing in 16 games. She returned home, racking up a 13-15 record on the mound with a 3.02 ERA and striking out 139 batters for the Jags.

In an exclusive interview with *The Southsider Voice*, the Fab Five answer some questions. The interview:

Q: What attracted you to IUPUI?

A: Overton: All my friends are here from around where I played softball. And I was ready to come home after being away for a year.

Keeley: I like the big-city feel, a big campus. I have played with some of my teammates here before this.

Dallas: I like it because it is so close to home, and being so close to Downtown too. There are a lot of opportunities, especially for business majors.

Thompson: All the opportunities that the university offers. I like being close to my family and being able to go home.

Turner: On the contrary, I wanted to go out

of state forever, but I couldn't pass up coming here and playing with some of the girls I've played softball with while growing up. Also, you can't beat the Kelly School of Business.

Q: What did you learn about playing softball in high school that you brought with you to the college level?

A: Overton: We had a good team my freshman and sophomore year, so I had to fight for a position. I learned that I had to battle on every pitch. As the years went on I learned that you had to be a leader too.

Keeley: You have to play as a team;

Cancer patient, family asking for prayers, support

The Southport community is showing strong support for Jean Miller, who is battling non-curable bone cancer.

Miller, a Roncalli alumna, has sons who attend Southport High School. Ben Miller, a senior, raised money in a fundraiser through his work at McAlister's Deli on Shelby Street on April 26.

"When I see people I just ask for prayers and moral support," Jean Miller said. "I have good insurance, but still a lot of medical bills are piling up right now."

Ten percent of the proceeds from dining at McAlister's went to Jean.

"I have been working here the past two years and my manager offered it to me," Ben said. "At first I was hesitant because I didn't know how my parents would be as far as privacy. I talked to my mom and she said it was a good idea."

It was a different response from Jean when she had to fight cancer over a decade ago. In 2005 she started chemotherapy for Stage III breast cancer. It took 26 chemo sessions, but she was cancer-free in 2007.

"Since I've been through this before I now know to ask for help as soon as possible. Take the help

Perry Perspectives

Perry Township Schools



Perry Township Schools is committed to taking a proactive approach in educating its students about the dangers of abusing opioids, which include some prescription medications. Each day 100 Americans die from opioid overdoses. In fact, 785 Hoosiers died from opioid overdoses in 2016, according to the Indiana State Department of Health. We appreciate the community partners who are leading the charge to help us empower our students to make responsible choices.

Last week Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill joined us at Perry Meridian High School to recognize the launch of a new prescription drug safety program aimed at helping students make wise decisions. Perry Meridian is the first school in Indianapolis to launch this digital curriculum, developed by the education firm EVERFI and financially sponsored by Walmart.

"Almost half of all teens incorrectly believe that prescription drugs are safer than illegal street drugs," Hill said. "We need to correct these misconceptions and help students make safe and healthy decisions."

The EVERFI program uses an evidence-based, public health approach to enabling students to make well-informed choices. Through interactive scenarios and self-guided activities, students learn facts about drugs, how to properly use and dispose of them and how to step in when faced with a situation involving misuse. The course is aligned with the Centers for Disease Control's National Health Education Standards and state academic standards.

Mr. Hill was joined by the following speakers: Pat Mapes, superintendent; Kert Boedicker, Perry Meridian principal; Kari Preston, Walmart director of health; Kevin Thompson, Walmart director of government affairs; and Mike Haley, IU Health's senior vice president of behavioral health. T

They all joined students during a lunchtime roundtable discussion. They discussed how to safely dispose of unused medications and why prescribed drugs can be dangerous when misused. The experience of hearing students articulate their thoughts on prescription medications was truly enlightening.

"The health and safety of our students is a priority," said Superintendent Mapes. "We believe education on prescription drug abuse can make a significant impact on helping our students make responsible choices."

After the discussion, all of the school and community leaders moved into the auditorium for an assembly with the entire freshmen class. Mr. Hill kicked off the discussion with a spirited Elvis impersonation, which excited the young audience. Next, he explained the seriousness of the opioid epidemic in our state. Mr. Haley detailed the health implications of abusing medications, while Ms. Preston and Mr. Thompson described their corporation's role in educating the community about the dangers of prescription drug abuse and improper disposal of medications.

It is our hope that this event will encourage ongoing conversations between our students and staff about making safe choices. The prescription drug safety program will launch next at Southport High.

There was a nice crowd on hand to help celebrate. Because the temperature was in the low 40s, I'm guessing some folks stayed home.

Had it been warm and sunny, I suspect more than 200 people might have been there. I was told the count was about 100.

Many people were involved in planning the memorial, and they all deserve a big thanks.

I have a couple of connections with Edgewood. I attended grade school there, and on Saturday I had the opportunity to visit with former classmates and students who were a few grades ahead of me.

Years later I drove a school bus that had a route connected to Edgewood. I visited with a couple of former riders and their families. I also spoke with a couple of former students who remembered that I had been a bus driver.

I was so pleased and surprised to see that former business owners and their families were present.

This dedication and previous reunions were coordinated by a couple of great guys who are former Edgewood students: Ted Lobdell and Barry Hix. They worked with the Perry Township School Board and the superintendent to obtain approval to have the memorial placed on school property.

The memories and the stories that have been shared over the past few years are wonderful. A few former students and friends told me that they had tears flowing when they first viewed the memorial.

After the ceremony we gathered at The Corner Bar at Old Meridian Street and Epler Avenue for lunch and to continue sharing our stories.

One of the memories that I shared was about the annual fish fry at Edgewood School. People could dine on-site or use the drive-thru. Those using the drive-thru entered off of Shelby Street and exited onto Epler. Sometimes that line through stretched north to almost Thompson Road.

you can't play for yourself.

Dallas: That's where I learned to be a player — how to hit, play your position and just learning to play with who's next to you on the field.

Thompson: I knew that coach Kathy Stricker didn't usually bring up freshmen to the varsity. It showed me that she had a lot of hope and belief in me. I learned to believe in yourself.

Turner: Playing at Center Grove, we had a target on our back all the time because we were one of the powerhouses in the state. I felt like I brought that here, knowing that everyone is coming after you to beat you. You have to fight for everything; nothing is going to be given to you.

Q: Also looking back at high school, what do you consider your best memory of playing softball?

A: Overton: My freshman and sophomore years I got to play with my sister, and the team had so much talent. Honestly we never thought we would lose a game. Those were really the fun years.

Keeley: Getting so far every year in the state tournament, especially 2015 by winning state. Starting in that game was my best memory.

Dallas: My favorite memory was not the state championship game but the journey to the game. We had to fight in every game; we couldn't take a game off. It was just a hard battle to get there.

Thompson: I have two memories. One was my freshman year and making it all the way to the state game; we didn't win but it was the journey. Second was my senior year when we made it to semistate. We were nine seniors on that team and we are close friends.

Turner: I thought the battle to get to state was the fun part. Winning the state was our reward for getting there.

Q: Playing softball at IUPUI, what has been your most difficult adjustment?

A: Overton: I would say the switch from pitching to hitting in games. Here, I pitch and I'm the leadoff hitter. I have to pitch to

get outs but then I have to bat for myself. I can't get down on myself if I don't hit well and I can't take my pitching to my at-bats. I had to do that in high school but it's an entirely different level here.

Keeley: I would say trying to adjust to new pitchers. In high school you see the same pitchers but in college, they're all different.

Dallas: The most difficult thing is to prove yourself. In high school everyone knows who you are. Here, most everyone is from a different area or state. You have to show them what kind of player you are.

Thompson: In high school I played outfield and coming in here last year I had to play shortstop. It was difficult but it turned out good.

Turner: Coming here, we had a different coach recruit us and once we got here we had a different coach. I was a middle infielder but had shoulder surgery in the fall and had to adapt to playing first base.

Q: Do you believe you five hold the key to the future success of softball at IUPUI?

A: Overton: We've played together for so long; we're going to play for each other and we're going to graduate together. So that's a really cool thing that we're doing. We are very lucky to be doing this.

Keeley: We get along so well together on the field. If something happens that goes against us, we're able to forget about it and keep playing.

Dallas: This is a great opportunity. Playing together, obviously we're going to be even better in the years ahead.

Thompson: Some of us have played on the same travel team, but just being able to fall back on them. I had to sit out this year because of Tommy John surgery but knowing they have my back and I have there's gives us the greatest feeling ever.

Turner: It's great that we are younger. We came from powerhouse high schools and travel teams, so we get to show our culture. By coming here, we can create a new culture: we're going to try and win, no matter what.

when it's offered," Jean said. "Before if I worked someplace and they asked to do a fundraiser, I would have been like, 'No, I'm fine.' You're not fine. You're going to be in debt up to your eyeballs."

Jean worked nearly 31 years at the Downtown post office before having to stop with her diagnosis.

Ben was amazed at the support the dining event has received as students from Southport, Perry Meridian and Greenwood responded. Ben, who played football at Southport and is in the National Honor Society, will be joining the military after graduation and is receiving support from there too.

"I'm enlisted in the Army and I'll be leaving for basic," he said. "My sergeant is over there, and he made a \$400 catering order today."

Ben recalls how the bone cancer was discovered during a trip to an archery range in March.

"Last month she felt a pain on her rib; she thought it was a strain because she went to an archery shoot. She couldn't move so she went to the hospital and found it was Stage IV bone cancer ... in the liver, spine and her ribs."

The tumor cannot be removed as Jean is on an experimental drug to keep the tumor from growing.

"There is nothing they can do to shrink it; all they can do is stop it from growing," Ben said.

Brett Boswell received appointments to all three military academies

Center Grove High School senior Brett Boswell received appointments to the Air Force and Naval academies and the Military Academy at West Point, a feat accomplished by less than 1 percent of those who applied to all three. Harrison Koppenhofer had a double and was credited with four RBIs and scored twice. Dominic Brown scored three times after reaching base on three walks.

Perry Meridian's Adam Taylor scored the team's lone run in the

fourth. The Falcons (3-14) dropped their seventh straight game but turned it around Monday with a 9-1 win against Covenant Christian. Their record is deceiving, according to first-year coach Jake Banwart.

"Every game we play it seems like we come up with one inning full of mistakes," Banwart said. "Our record doesn't look pretty, but I believe we are one game away from really clicking. We are proving we can play against good teams."

Perry Meridian is host to Warren Central in a first-round game Friday in the Marion County tournament, which continues Saturday. Roncalli is at home Friday against Speedway.


