

## A chance meeting results in colorful wall mural

"The world needs more beauty." With that stated belief, Beck Service Center co-owner Ben Stallings had been looking for an artist for several months when a chance meeting with an artist from New Orleans in January took place.

Young mural artist Henry Lipkis spotted a used Honda Civic online at a Southside car lot and had also looked up a vehicle service shop online that could look it over. He stopped by Beck Service Center at 6025 Madison Av-

enue and began talking with Stallings.

"The car needed some work which we did, but he was an artist and I looked at some of his work online," Stallings said. "It turned out; he was the right guy after all."

Lipkis returned to New Orleans for his busiest time of the year, Mardi Gras, and made the return trek to the Southside in early May.

"I sent him (Lipkis) an estimate by e-mail that we agreed upon," Stallings recalled. "I had wanted something done to those walls that added beauty."

# Kennedy Tank builds and moves 140-foot vessel

Most families on the Southside have experienced moving day from one home to another.

It's not an easy task but much easier than the challenge that Kennedy Tank and Manufacturing had earlier this month in moving a 200,000-pound, eight-foot wide and 140-foot long vessel for more than 100 miles.

"This project ranks among the top-five in size and weight that we have built and transported," Kennedy Tank business development specialist Jimmy Kennedy said. "It was built in two 70-foot sections that took up 50 percent of our bay area, so we had to be aware of the size of other projects for a while."

The column is to be used to heat and cool liquid to an optimized state.

Building 50 internal tray supports that had to be matched up with full penetration welds was among the most intricate challenge faced by the tank builders at Kennedy. The supports had to line up exactly.

Kennedy said 12 craftsmen were involved

in building the distillation column at Kennedy Tank headquarters at 833 E. Sumner Ave.

It utilized five shipping platforms with 40 supports so it could be transported in one piece. Transporting the column required special routing, police


With all of the fun of the Disney film, The Little Mermaid features the songs "Under the Sea," "Kiss the Girl," and "Part of Your World."

## Perry Township Schools

### Library Cards Summer Reading



The last day of the 2018-19 school year is Thursday, May 23. When classes end with the chime of the final bell, we want students to continue learning. We are thankful to community partners who encourage education outside of the classroom even when school is not in session.

The Indianapolis Public Library generously handed out free library cards to students in Perry Township and across Marion County. During a distribution ceremony at Abraham Lincoln Elementary School, Library representatives began passing out 14,697 cards for students in grades one through twelve. Of those recipients, 10,557 students were new cardholders.

Because reading opens new worlds filled with thrills and surprises, the ceremony was designed with fanfare to match. Cheerleaders from Perry Meridian High, adorned with spirit wear, joined the festivities and surprised students as they received their library cards. The cards include online access to eBooks, eAudiobooks, streaming music and video, and more than 80 research databases for learning or leisure. Library staff even plans to train teachers to use the databases properly to ensure students maximize the features once school resumes.

The sooner that students can build confidence in reading, the sooner they can build confidence in their other courses. Little readers at Jeremiah Gray Kindergarten Academy (JGKA) are thriving thanks to a valuable partnership with the M.A. Rooney Foundation, which is a nonprofit committed to ensuring that students in K-2 are reading at grade level. The K-2 threshold is critical because many experts believe that a student's reading level in third grade provides a strong indication of future success in the classroom and in society. According to a number of studies, students who read proficiently by the time they have finished third grade keep pace with peers or excel in later school years.

At JGKA, the M.A. Rooney Foundation provides school-wide training of all teachers and instructional aides at no cost. Twice each month, the Foundation provides ongoing support for free. They have even co-taught with teachers and provided feedback. The Foundation uses a method known as the Orton-Gillingham multisensory phonetic teaching approach. Their efforts have proven effective with 91 percent of JGKA students reaching proficiency or above in the Dibels Composite assessment, a measure of early literacy skills.

Even in summer months when children are home, literacy experts still recommend 15 to 20 minutes of reading each day for beginners. Other reading recommendations still stand, as well:

- Read every day – The more children are exposed to books, the more likely it is that reading will become more routine.
- Make suggestions – Recommend books that match your child's interests.
- Give rewards – Consider buying your child a new book or making an extra trip to the library as an incentive.
- Surround children with books and magazines - Children who have access to grade-appropriate reading materials at home tend to perform better on standardized tests.

Literacy is the foundation for lifelong learning. Perry Township Schools is committed to teaching students the building blocks of success at every grade level.

## Personal Recollections By Fred Shonk

### 500 ON RADIO & A.J. FOYT

I can't remember not listening to the Indianapolis 500-mile race on the radio.

As young kids and teenagers, we listened to the radio much more than any other form of entertainment. My folks had one of those big radios that sat on the floor. I can remember laying on the floor and listening to my favorite shows - the Lone Ranger and Superman were high on my list. My parents also had a list of shows that were listened to in the evenings. Jack Benny, Burns and Allen, Our Miss Brooks and many others were listened to in our living room. Lots of the best radio shows later were converted to television.

I remember listening to the race while riding in my dad's milk truck. Those country pick-up milk routes operated seven days a week. We could listen to a good part of the race before we completed the route before arriving home. I would then switch to a radio in the house to finish race. The program was sent all over the world, and I thought it was so cool that all the announcers were local fellows that we could hear every day.

E.Z. Gwynn, Sid Collins, Jim Shelton, Paul Page, Bob Jenkins and many others entertained us over the years. One local Southside radio personality was a member of the track team. Tom Peden worked with one of the local radio stations and was one of the guys we would hear on the race broadcast. His son, Mark, attended Southport High School and was a member of my high school class. I always thought that if I visited the track a time or two during the month of May, I could fully imagine A.J. Foyt and all the others screaming past the start/finish line as the announcers reported it on the network.

I plan to sit in our backyard and listen to the race on Sunday and hope to have a great time. Stuart will probably hang out with me. I'm sure he will hop on my lap a few times and help me enjoy it.

I was excited when a NASCAR race started at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. A few years ago, I offered an article about getting to tour Junior Johnson's NASCAR racing facilities. For years he drove and owned stock cars. During the tour I noticed a real problem with the use of some fasteners on these cars. I explained to the crew about the problem and offered a solution. They crew members summoned Johnson to the garage, and I was asked to explain it to him. He understood and asked us to travel to all the other NASCAR race shops and explain my thoughts to them.

I pointed out that he and his employees would be seeing all those racers that weekend and they could easily make the explanation in a couple of hours. His response was that the owners and teams lied to each other so much that he wouldn't be believed. So, we needed to send sales agents to each facility to help with the corrections.

One other time, I was working with a salesperson in Houston, Texas, who had several clients at large dealerships where our main contact was the parts manager. At one dealership we visited, I was introduced to the parts manager and told him I was from Indianapolis. The parts manager paused and was eager to introduce me to the fellow who owned the dealership. I was pretty sure that I knew who it was. At this dealership, there were standing orders to contact the boss if anyone from Indianapolis ever showed up.

A.J. Foyt came out and shook my hand and started asking me questions. We had a blast tossing out names to see if we had connections. The one I remember was Joe Langley. Joe was an Indy 500 chief mechanic and later an outside sales representative for an automotive chemical company. Joe's shop was behind his house on Madison Avenue.

Visiting with A.J. was a wonderful and totally unexpected. He has been a bit under the weather for several years. I saw that he attended the Daytona Races in February. I hope he is here for the 2019 Indianapolis 500.



It took three months to fabricate and build the distillation vessel.



## What drives team owner Reinbold? 'I want to win this race'

Longtime Indianapolis 500 team owner Dennis Reinbold was asked point blank earlier this month about the fuel that drives him to return year after year to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

"I've got to win this race," the Greenwood auto dealership owner replied. "I mean, we need to win, and that's really it. That's the only reason we show up - to put the car in victory lane. We work year-round to try to do that and try to improve and get better than we have before."

The personable team owner is among the early teams in the series that has evolved into the NTT IndyCar Series. Driver Robbie Buhl won for Dreyer & Reinbold Racing in 2000 at Orlando, Fla. His team competed in the series until 2013; since then, it has been a multiple-car effort in the Indianapolis 500.

Reinbold returns with drivers Sage Karam for his sixth 500, JR Hildebrand for the second time with the team and ninth overall.

"Sixth times a charm," Karam, 24 years old, said of his prospects Sunday.

The team's best finish came in 2012 when Oriol Servia finished fourth for co-owners Reinbold and Panther Racing. Last year, Karam started 24th, worked his way into sixth place on lap 154 but then crashed on the next lap. Hildebrand started 27th and finished 11th.

"A lot of times I'll sit there through the middle of the race and say, all the things that we worked on in the last year have piled up to this moment, and we're as prepared and ready to win this race as possible, and for whatever reason we haven't pulled that off quite as of yet," Reinbold explained. "Here's to this being the year."

Reinbold, a descendant of Duesenberg racing mechanic "Pop" Dreyer, strives to return to the IndyCar series fulltime.

"That's definitely on our radar," he said hopefully. "We do aspire

to be more involved; we believe in IndyCar very, very much. We may have to do part-time to get there. We have to make it work out financially and every other aspect."

Meanwhile, Dreyer & Reinbold Racing has four cars in IMG-sanctioned American Rallycross ARX2 with six different drivers, including Karam. The team won the 2017 championship and was second last year. Internationally, rallycross is to begin racing with electric-powered cars in 2022 overseas.

Owning two racecars among eight "one-off" cars, Reinbold laughed when asked about fulltime teams having guaranteed spots in the Indianapolis 500.

He immediately grinned and said, "It says they're scared of us."

Reinbold added, "I don't think it's an issue. I mean, we have to beat people to get in the race this year, so it's going to be the same way going forward."

Wearing No. 48, the local sponsored SalesForce Chevrolet Dallara driven by Hildebrand is a tribute to famed team owner, car builder and driver Dan Gurney. Bobby Unser provided Gurney with his only 500 win in the 1975 500. Gurney finished second in 1968 and 1969 driving his famed Eagle brand.

Hildebrand qualified late Saturday at 227.908 mph and is on the outside of the seventh row.

Karam tried five times to qualify among positions 10-30 under the new format but wasn't fast enough so he was among six drivers seeking three last-row positions. After a long rain delay, the former high school wrestler put the No. 24 WIX Filters in the field at 227.740 mph, the fastest among qualifiers for the last row.

"When you do something special, it really feels great," Karam said of his pressure-filled run. "You look at the guys in the last chance six now. There were big names and big teams. We're a strong one-off race team."

They hope to show the strength of Dreyer Reinbold Racing on race day Sunday.

## Byrd family continues 500 legacy with Davison solidly in lineup

The Jonathan Byrd family continues their Indianapolis 500 legacy Sunday that began in 1985 at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. The late family patriarch Jonathan Byrd had his first car sponsorship in late-model Figure-8s at the Indianapolis Speedrome in 1982 before advancing to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway with midget-sprint car ace Rich Vogler. The hard-charging driver had a top finish of eighth place in the 500. He died in a sprint car accident in 2016 at Salem Speedway.

Matriarch Ginny Byrd remains as "team mom," cheerleader, encourager and baker of goodies for the team. Son David Byrd heads the operations for Byrd Racing and family enterprises in the Phoenix area, including four hotels and Jonathan Byrd II continues his involvement in motorsports as president of the Indianapolis Speedrome.

The sons grew up in Greenwood where their parents owned former Kentucky Fried Chicken franchises in Johnson County and Jonathan Byrd's Cafeteria in Greenwood. No longer on the Southside, the family continues the heritage with Jonathan Byrd's Hospitality and Restaurant Group, including 502 East Event Center in Carmel.

David Byrd has teamed Byrd Racing with veteran 500 team owner Dale Coyne in a Honda-powered entry with Australian driver James Davison for the second time. Byrd came to his first 500 as an 8-year-old boy when his passion for the 500 and open wheel racing was fostered.

"This is something our family can do together," Byrd said. He spoke lovingly of what he learned from his father who died in 2009 about the sport that can be an ecstatic to tragic experience.

"Stay in your lane," Byrd replied immediately. "Make sure you can do what you do well. You cannot second-guess and you have to stay focused on what you can do and let those on your team focus on their duties."

"There's a lot of outside interference here (500) that you have to ignore," Byrd continued. "I know I have earned my way to be able to do certain roles. Others here - drivers, crew chiefs, mechanics and crew members have earned it by the sweat of their brow. My role is to put the best program together at Indy."

He expressed respect for Coyne whom they teamed with at the 500 two years ago.

"He has a top-flight program," Byrd said. "He, like us, utilizes his business interests to support racing."

The Byrd family also is involved as a co-entrant in USAC Silver Crown and sprint car races for drivers Chris Windom and Kevin Thomas. Byrd is a co-entrant for Windham in the Indy Lights Freedom 100 Friday at the Speedway.

Byrd is among nine "one-off" efforts and he admits, "It definitely is a challenge."

They were up for the challenge Saturday during one-day time trials to determine positions 10-30 for the 103rd running of the Indianapolis 500 Sunday. Davison qualified Saturday at 228.273 and will start on the outside of the fifth row.

"This is such a team sport, and when you're a one-off team, you don't have the chemistry and momentum that the full-season teams do," Davison, a second-generation driver said. "For my guys, as a group, to pull that off, I'm just so proud of them. I feel like I'm on cloud nine."

Davison also brings a bit of nostalgia to the Coyne-Byrd-Belardi entry by honoring his late grandfather, Gaze Davison, a decorated World War II Spitfire pilot who was honored with the Distinguished Flying

Cross three times.

His helmet recognizes Gaze's heroics with classic RAF colors with the Distinguished Flying Cross and two bars. Gaze Davison also became the first Australian driver in Formula 1 in 1952 at the Belgian Grand Prix.

The combined Byrd-Coyne-Belardi No. 33 entry picked up a new sponsor, SAFE, a revolutionary brand of antifreeze that is non-toxic. The company is owned by Bradley Miller who also owns businesses in Phoenix, Arizona.

Byrd's best moment came in 1996 when Arie Luyendyk, driving for co-entrants John Treadway and Jonathan Byrd, set one-lap (237.498 mph) and four-lap (236.986 mph) that still stand. And later with Vogler-like charger Bryan Clauson, they led the 500 for the first time in 2016.

However, tragedy struck again as Clauson died in a racing accident later that same year.

They did not enter a race car for the 500 in 2017 race but returned last year with Davison to continue a racing legacy that began at the Speedrome and a food service legacy that began in Greenwood.

Greenwood High School alumna Mike Ford received the highest of compliments from Indianapolis 500 pole winner Simon Pagenaud earlier this month.

Ford has been Pagenaud's spotter for several years. He not only witnessed but helped guide the open-wheel veteran to a dramatic late-race sixth- to first-place charge in the rain to win the IndyCar Grand Prix on the road course at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway (IMS).

"He's the best there is," Pagenaud said. "No driver could ask for a better spotter."

Ford made it as quickly as he could to the victory celebration after the road course race and did the same thing Sunday after Pagenaud nailed down pole position at 229.992 mph.

"Amazing run, amazing run," was all Ford could say as the No. 22 Team Penske crew gathered for pole-winning photos.

This is Pagenaud's first 500 pole; his best previous start was in the middle of the front row last year. Team Penske has earned 18 pole positions at Indy.

### Lugar tributes

IMS president Doug Boles paid a heartfelt tribute to the late Indiana Sen. Richard G. Lugar during remarks Sunday on Crown Royal Armed Forces qualifying day in front of new inductees into all military branches.

Boles spoke eloquently of Lugar's original participation in the annual event. He praised Lugar for his devotion to IMS, the ceremony and dedication to Indiana, Indianapolis and the world.

Major General Corey D. Carr, Adjutant General of the Indiana National Guard, also spoke of the connection of IMS and the ceremony, noting that the support that Indianapolis 500 drivers have with crew, engineers and research and development is similar to the military that backs each soldier with the highest degree of support, equipment and technology.

### Top qualifiers

Driver-team owner Ed Carpenter, an Indianapolis Speedrome Legends Cars graduate, qualified second for his fifth front-row start in the 500. He has started first or second in five of his last seven 500s. Spencer Pigot qualified third for his first 500 front-row start and a career-best NTT IndyCar Series start.

### First-day format


The mood among motorsports reporters in the IMS media center about the change in first-day qualifying format was that it produced drama unheralded for many years. The fans witnessed drivers locking in starting grid spots 10 through 30. After the qualifying line had passed, teams made 34 more qualifying runs to sit in those seven rows on race day.

Formula One-star Fernando Alonso, the darling of the Speedway last year, made five attempts to qualify but was not fast enough at 227.224 mph. Dreyer & Reinbold driver Sage Karam also made five attempts with a top speed of 226.951 mph, not fast enough. And hard-luck James Hinchcliffe crashed hard during his first try but returned three more times without adequate speed Saturday.


Popular Graham Rahal was the last driver to qualify successfully Saturday with a final run of 228.104 mph to start 17th on the race-day grid.

His description of the new format: "I don't know what the fans thought, but there was plenty of intensity in the pits, plenty of intensity."

The consensus: The new format was well worth the \$20 general admission ticket.

### Six rookies

There are six rookies in the field. This year's rookies are Marcus Ericsson, Santino Ferrucci, Ben Hanley, Colton Herta, Jordan King and Felix Rosenqvist. Last year there were four rookies in the race.

### Pace car driver

NASCAR legend Dale Earnhardt Jr. has double duty on race day at the Indianapolis 500. The two-time Daytona 500 winner will drive the Corvette Grand Sport official pace car and serve as an NBC Sports commentator for the network's first live telecast of the 500.

"This (pace car) will be an experience that I'll cherish forever," he stated. "Driving the pace car takes it to another level."

Earnhardt has never been at the Speedway to see the 500 because of NASCAR racing commitments to the World 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway. He has visited the track several times during time trials.

### Third appearance

Multiple Grammy Award-winning star Kelly Clarkson will perform the National Anthem for the second consecutive 500 Sunday. She also sang the anthem with Seal prior to the 2011 race. Clarkson will be at the Speedway on the heels of Tuesday's 16th season finale of NBC's "The Voice," where she serves as one of four coaches.

Boles praises her as "a global icon and incredible singer" and that her rendition of the anthem is "stirring and poignant."

### Seven winners

There are seven former Indianapolis 500 winners in the starting field: Helio Castroneves (2001, 2002, 2009), Scott Dixon (2008), Tony Kanaan (2013), Ryan Hunter-Reay (2014), Alexander Rossi (2016), Takuma Sato (2017) and Will Power (2018). Between them, they have nine victories. The record for most former winners in the field is 10, in 1992. The fewest, other than the inaugural race in 1911, is zero in 1912.

### Sullivan returns

Seeing 500 winner Danny Sullivan as a broadcaster for Sirius XM in the media center was one of the oddities of the qualifying weekend at IMS. Sullivan, famous for his "spin and win" in 1985, uses his vast knowledge of racing around the world during his interviews. In a recent interview with 500 driver Charlie Kimball, they recalled their days of racing in Europe. Sirius XM launched a radio program, The Real Spin, with Sullivan and a co-host.

### Penske's 50th anniversary

Not only is this year the 50th anniversary of Mario Andretti's only 500 win, but it also is Roger Penske's 50th anniversary of his first Indianapolis 500 entry with Mark Donohue. Dressed in all-white crew uniforms, Penske not only revolutionized team dress at IMS but launched a record-breaking career. Donohue and Penske teamed to win the 1972 race, the first of 17 eventual winners among 12 drivers.

### Closest field ever

This is the closest starting field in Indianapolis 500 history, by time. Pagenaud's time was 1.8932 seconds quicker than the slowest qualifier Pippa Mann. The previous record was 2.1509 seconds between pole sitter Ed Carpenter and slowest qualifier Buddy Lazier in 2014.

## Cummins in Greenwood to open more I-65 area growth

With Cummins Inc., coming to Greenwood with a futuristic hub for digital and information technology, it finally opens the door for development of problematic land at the southeast corner of I-65 and County Line Road.

Cummins Inc. CEO Tom Linebarger announced Thursday that the Columbus-based global company would build a \$35 million facility at that site for expansion of its digital and information services internally and for customers.

Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers said that the hub would have 500 employees with an average salary of \$100,000 per employee.

Myers and Greater Greenwood Chamber of Commerce president Christian Maslowski agreed that it would spur immediate interest in an area that Cabela's, GoodSports Enterprises Global and Gershman Partners/Indy Fuel publicly sought but backed out due to finances.

Maslowski emphasized that the area's 100-plus acres is ripe for non-warehouse and non-retail growth.

"This will open up an area that is now primed for multiple types of development," Maslowski said. "The big plus is that it provides diversity in land use and will benefit Greenwood tremendously."

Cummins Inc. would occupy 31 acres of land for its expansion into Greenwood. Myers grinned and said that Greenwood becomes the "heart" of the "Cummins Corridor" on I-65 that includes facilities in Indianapolis, Columbus and Seymour.

The 100,000-square foot facility planned for Greenwood will house 500 employees with an average annual pay of \$100,000.

"Getting a leading corporation to relocate into the Greenwood market, for us, is absolutely huge," Myers said. "It also is a model for corporate-community partnerships."

The partnership also includes a one-million-dollar grant from the City of Greenwood to Central Nine Career Center specifically to expand courses for high school students studying information technology and interactive media.

Outgoing Central Nine director Nicole Otte emphasized that in the future some graduates in those fields from Central Nine would be trained to be hired immediately by Cummins Inc.

Myers and Linebarger were among five speakers Thursday, including Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb, Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett, and Columbus Mayor Jim Linehoop. The announcement was made during Cummins Day at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Expansion in Columbus with its electrification program will enable Cummins to become an industry leader in electrified power trains to replace diesel power in city buses and delivery vehicles.

Greenwood would become the hub for more data and services through electronics to fix any issues on the road as well as developing new digital technology.

Linebarger praised the City of Greenwood and said, "Mayor Myers and his team did an outstanding job assuring us that Greenwood is the place to locate. Our intent is to be an asset to the community and be glad that we are a part of that community."

Cummins would be able to expand the footprint at its Greenwood location in the future.

The company is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year.




