



The inaugural class of inductees:

Paul Bailey, (deceased) Edgewood Grade School principal for three decades; mentored student Frank Kautsky in basketball skills; later played on the Kautskys

Louie Dampier, Southport High School standout and Indiana All-Star; starred for University of Kentucky's "Rupp's Runts," 1966 NCAA runner-up team; played for ABA Kentucky Colonels and NBA San Antonio Spurs, Southport Wall of Fame inductee.

Steve Downing, led Washington High School to 31-0 record and 1969 state title; starred at Indiana University; played for Boston Celtics 1974 NBA championship team.

Oral Hildebrand (deceased), Southport native; Edgewood court player and played for the Kautksys; led Butler University to 1929 national basketball title; began pro baseball career in 1930 with Indianapolis Indians; played in majors with Indians, 1939 World Series champion Browns, and Yankees.

Frank Kautsky, (deceased) owned Kautsky's grocery in Edgewood for 40 years; co-founded the Indianapolis Kautskys of the Midwest Conference that became the National Basketball League in 1937; Kautskys players included Branch McCracken (1932-1938) and John Wooden (1933-1939).

George McGinnis, Mr. Basketball Indiana and star of Washington Continentals 1969 state championship team; high school and college teammate of Downing; I.U. standout who became first sophomore to lead Big 10 in scoring and rebounding; led Indiana Pacers to two ABA titles; three-time NBA All-Star; played in NBA with 76ers, Nuggets and Pacers.

Pat Williams, Southport High School standout basketball player; Hanover College all-conference basketball player; founder of Pistol Pat basketball camps; Southport Wall of Fame inductee.

Southside historian and The Southsider Voice columnist Fred Shonk served as master of ceremonies for the induction ceremony at the Perry Township Education

"History, I love it," Shonk said. "We began working on this many years ago. To see it become real is an honor for everyone who played on the courts."

The Edgewood courts covered a small one block area near Epler and Madison avenues and attracted the best players from area high schools with many players continuing in college and the pros.

In their remarks July 23, Louie Dampier and Williams mentioned the high level of competition on the courts made them better basketball players.

"The reason we are here tonight is because they had even or eight basketball goals," Dampier recalled. "They had one full court, and then the others were just one basket. Some of the best players and that's where the competition was. That's how players got better as you heard Pat Williams say.

Dampier concluded, "It just happened to be the area where the best players came whether they went to South-

Dampier told the story of how he ended up playing basketball for the University of Kentucky instead of I.U. However, George McGinnis and Steve Downing played on the Edgewood courts and later for the Hoosiers.

BEECH GROVE SCHOOLS OPENING DAY BEGINS

Today, we begin the 2019-2020 school year at Beech Grove City Schools. And, we will be ready to open the high school for the first day of

We may encounter a few challenges in the first few days as our high school staff and stu-dents adjust to different locations of classrooms, traffic flow, and other potential constructionrelated issues. However, I have full confidence in our staff and students to ensure a smooth start to the school year!

Classrooms are already set up and ready for our students. Rooms, carpets, and tiles are being cleaned daily, salvageable science classroom items have been moved from the high school café and other areas of the building and are in a secure storage area, filters are being replaced, and ceiling grids and tiles have been installed. Our restoration and construction contractors have scheduled additional crews to assist with arranging furniture and moving materials into classrooms for our teachers. Although not all classrooms will have replacement carpet installed by the first day of school, the carpet will be installed later in the semester. We anticipate the tennis courts/fences will be repaired within the next five weeks. Additional leaks have been discovered in a few portions of the high school roof. The affected roofing is in the process of being repaired and/or replaced as necessary. Please note the following instructions for entering the high school/Hornet Park Elementary

Traffic Instructions for Beech Grove High School and Hornet Park Elementary campuses ALL traffic must enter via Hornet Avenue to access Beech Grove High School and Hornet Park Elementary School. There is no access from Churchman Avenue.

At Beech Grove High School, student drivers will be restricted to parking in the southwest lot; student drop-off will take place in front of the high school entrance; after student drop-off off, vehicles must continue around the circle and exit via Hornet Avenue.

At Hornet Park Elementary School, to join the car-rider line, please drive through the high school parking lot to the Southeast corner of the elementary school building, where you will loop around, and your child will enter the building. The line will form. Staff will begin welcoming students into the building at 7:40 a.m. Student drop-off will be supervised until 8 a.m. As drivers exit the car-rider line, you will turn right onto the Butler Avenue extension. At 8 a.m., the car-rider line will be closed, and any further arrivals are asked to check in at the front office.

We remain grateful for all your support as we continue to recover from the damages caused by the June tornado. Thank you for your understanding, patience, and flexibility. #BGStrong



Back to School, Not the Doctor's Office

August is a wonderful time in central Indiana. Kids are holding onto the fleeting moments of summer by making nightly attempts to extend their bedtime and plugging their ears before the dreaded school bell tolls once again. Parents, on the other hand, are yearning for a little peace and quiet while dragging their kids to the local department store to make sure their children are fully equipped with all the materials needed for the new

Even though their kids may be fully prepared to return to school, parents may be forgetting to provide them with their most important tool; immunizations. The best laid plans to achieve the smooth transition to the new year can go awry

if a child is out sick. August is National Immunization Month and that's just what immunizations do, keep your child healthy and ensure he or she isn't falling behind. Immunizations are the gatekeeper to a community's health. In an

immunized community, that gatekeeper isn't letting any serious illness pass through its gates. When parents immunize their children not only are they protecting their own child, they're helping prevent the spread of disease throughout the daycare or school their child attends. That duty to protect the community doesn't end when the child enters high school since incoming freshmen are required to have boosters and new vaccines as well. Measles especially has been one of the bigger diseases to re-

surface, with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reporting 1,109 cases as of July 3 in this calendar year alone. The number, which is the highest figure since 1994, tells a different story than the announcement at the turn of the century of the disease's eradication. The CDC recommends that people get an MMR vaccine to protect against measles, mumps, and rubella. Children should get two doses of MMR vaccine, starting with the first dose at 12 to 15 months of age, and the second dose at 4 through 6 years of age. Teens and adults should also be up to date on their MMR vaccination.

All of us lead busy lives carrying too much responsibility to risk getting sick or having to stay home with sick children. Vaccines can help everyone stay healthy and avoid missing school or work, and also help prevent illnesses that can lead to hospitalization or even death. If you can avoid getting sick, you will have more time for your family, friends

Two new Southside roundabouts to open

Good news and bad news arrives this week for Southside motorists.

The Indianapolis Department of Public Works (DPW) revealed that the roundabout at Franklin Road and Edgewood Avenue was opened Saturday, and the roundabout at Arlington

and Edgewood Avenue is to open Friday.

However, Southside motorists will find two intersections closed while new roundabouts are built to allow for smooth traffic

The intersection at Franklin Road and Thompson Road is to be closed today. Motorists can detour from Franklin Road to Hanna Ave. to Five Points to Edgewood and back to Franklin Road. Northbound motorists can go from Edgewood Ave. to Hickory Road and east on Thompson Road.

The intersection at Arlington Avenue and Shelbyville Road will close Aug. 19. Southbound motorists on Arlington Ave. can go east on Edgewood Ave. and south on Five Points to reconnect. Northbound motorists can go west on Southport Road to Emerson Ave. and east on Edgewood Ave. to re-connect.

Each closure is expected to last no more than 60 days. Motorists are advised to utilize posted routes for detours

The roundabouts are part of an intersection improvement plan with a price tag of \$400 million to rehabilitate bridges, rebuild roads and increase pedestrian safety through 2022







The end of World War II saw the three American automobile manufacturers returning to civilian passenger car production after serving the country's defense

needs for most of the 1940's.

It featured six different body styles and several new Ford innovations. All featured the Fairlane "stripe" down the side.

The Fairlane had the all-new Y-Block V8 engine as well as an

inline-6 available. For the first time seat-belts were offered, but only as a dealer-installed option, not from the factory. It also featured a new safety panoramic windshield like the GM Buick, Oldsmobile and Cadillacs of the day. Also new was a factory installed "Select Aire" airconditioning system.

Clyde has owned his two-door convertible '55 Fairlane Sunliner since 1981. He originally bought it and began restoring it for his wife. In the 1990s, he rebuilt the 312 Y-Block V8 engine with 4-barrel carburetor. The raw power from the engine is sent through the straight-stick 3-speed manual transmission.

He then meticulously had the interior fully restored. For the past

38 years, Clyde has returned this magnificent machine back to its original luster, in fact he's made it even better than the factory luster, in fact he's made it even better than the factory.








