

# Ninth-place finish by Harvey **honors Pat Kennedy**

Pat Kennedy, who died April 12 due to the COVID-19 virus, was honored in the 104th running of the Indianapolis 500 Sunday by driver Jack Harvey and the Meyer Shank Racing (MSR) team.

This was the first "500" held without spectators due to coronavirus concerns at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway and the first under the ownership of Roger Penske who gave the command to start engines.

Harvey's helmet bore an all-new tribute design in memory of Kennedy, who was an avid "500" fan.

Kennedy, 63, was the fourthgeneration president of Kennedy Tank & Manufacturing Co. located on the Southside, that was the designated gas tank supplier for the annual 500-Mile Race. He had attended every "500" since 1963.

Harvey drove the tribute race car to ninth place after starting 20th. He began flirting with the top 10 midway through the race. He was 11th before pitting midrace, dropped to 13th and moved into ninth with 60 laps

to go. Harvey credited the MSR crew with five perfect pit stops that allowed him to leapfrog into the top 10.

He dedicated his race to Kennedy.

"I am so happy with where we finished," Harvey said in a statement released by the team. "I am so proud of the guys on pit lane, they absolutely nailed it. We had some really great restarts which helped us as well.'

The No. 60 entry also bore an all-white Yard of Bricks with Pat" at the center on the nose

of the No. 60 racecar. Harvey stated, "Without Pat, I wouldn't be where I am in Indy

Kennedy and his sister, Ann Bolin met Harvey upon his arrival in the U.S. in 2014 and befriended him. He also raised \$30,000 for Harvey's first "500" in 2017. Their introduction came about with SiriusXM CEO Jim Meyer. Kennedy was in the

team's pit box for each "500. This is something I knew that I wanted to do for Pat," Harvey said. "This helmet is a way for me to say 'Thank You' for everything that Pat has done for me. He's turned many laps around IMS, although never in the 500, and this was, in a way, a final tribute to a guy who was

instrumental in my life. Harvey continued. "What Pat and Ann did for me when I first moved to the States is something, I will never forget Pat was a huge racing fan, so naturally we bonded over that. He was such a family man and easy to be around, he became someone that I could go to for personal advice as well

His Race Day finish added more to Kennedy's legacy at the

#### DRR 16TH AND 24TH

Dreyer Reinbold Racing (DRR) finished 16th with J. R. Hildebrand and 24th with Sage Karam. Each driver started from the last row. Driving the No. 67 DRR Salesforce entry, Hildebrand gained 16 positions from start to finish, second only Sunday to three-time "500" winner Helio Castroneves, who started 28th and finished 11th, a

gain of 17 spots. Karam finished two laps

#### DAVISON OUT EARLY

The return of Jonathan Byrd Racing with driver James Davison was short-lived. Davison was the first car out of action when the right front brake rotor overheated and caused tire damage on the fifth lap. Davison placed 33rd in the Jacob Construction/TiltonHR-sponsored

Byrd Racing consisting of matriarch Ginny Byrd and sons Jonathan II and David have the same desire to return to the "500" to continue the legacy of the late Jonathan Byrd.

#### DIXON-ROSSI DUEL

The mid-race duel between Scott Dixon and Alexander Rossi (eight lead changes in 18 laps) was fierce but ended when Rossi pitted later and was sent to the back of the pack by track officials for an "unsafe release" from his pit.

"I'm not saying it's right or wrong; I just don't understand it (penalty)," said Rossi who crashed on lap 145. "It's pretty aggressive in the 500 to send you to the back of the line for something benign." Dixon, who led for 111 laps, finished second to Takuma Sato,

who becomes the 20th multiple winner of the "500." The race ended under caution and checkered flags after Nelson Pigot slammed into a protective barrier at the pit entrance with five laps left in the race. "Finishing second at Indy (third time) isn't much fun," Dixon said. "You have to capture the moment when you can, but catch a caution

Sato's Rahal Letterman Lanigan teammate Graham Rahal was third, Santino Ferrucci fourth, and Josef Newgarden fifth. The 105th Indianapolis 500 is scheduled for May 30, 2021.



#### **INDY 500 BROADCASTS**

We have never experienced so many drastic changes in how we attempt to live our day to day lives. From wearing masks to bumping elbows to staying home all the time, I think for the most part that we have adapted to our new lives.

That is until last weekend. August 23, the day of the 104th running of the Indianapolis 500-Mile Race. This was the first time that the race wasn't held on Memorial Day weekend, except for World War I (1917) and II (1942-1945) or rain postponement.

I remember that my father took me to the noon of practice as a young boy. He would do his country milk route to farms, pick up milk, and deliver to a local processing plant. He would leave our house around 6 a.m. and return by 2 p.m.

Several times, I traveled with him on the day of the "500." We would listen to the race on the radio in his truck. Radio coverage was becoming so popular in the mid-1950's that the Speedway formed its own radio broadcast network. Chief announcers, known as "The Voice of the 500," have been Sid Collins, Paul Page, Lou Palmer, and Bob Jenkins. During the 2016 race, Page turned his duties over to Mark Jaynes, a former Beech Grove High School communications teacher. Page contributed some commentary during the radio broadcast Sunday.

In 1949, I went with my dad on the milk route on Race Day. After we finished the route, we stopped at a retail store at the dairy. When we walked inside, I was surprised to see that they had a television turned on with a live telecast of the "500." It was so cool, we stood and watched for several minutes and then headed home.

We listened to the race as we drove home. We didn't have a TV in our home at that time. So, our big old radio in the living room provided us with the call of the rest of the race.

I have shared that story with folks over the years and most of the time I was told that the race was always blacked out in the central Indiana area. So, I did a little research to jog my memory. The first nationwide telecast of the Indianapolis 500 was offered by WFBM-TV, Channel 6, in Indianapolis with three cameras positioned along the frontstretch in 1949 and 1950.

An estimated 3,000 viewers saw the race on TV mainly to promote the sale of more sets in the community. There was no audio or video recording of the races then. However, the telecasts were blacked out locally to encourage spectators to attend the race.

While living in California and Michigan, I would watch the race on TV but with the sound turned down and listen to the call of the race on my radio with much excitement.

"I am proud of our educators who are keenly focused on giving our EL students the tools they need to thrive," said Pat Mapes, Superintendent of Perry Township Schools. "Our educators are trained to adapt their teaching methods to reach children regardless of nationality, socioeconomic background, learning disabilities, and personal challenges. According to the most recent World-Class Instructional Design and Assessment (WIDA)—which measures multilingual readers—47 percent of our EL population reads at a Level 5, the most proficient level. This result represents a 21 percent increase over the previous year.

Perry Township Schools' EL Department consists of 10 staff members at the district level (i.e., Central Office). Within our 23 schools, 88 tutors/translators, facilitators, EL teachers, and aides support the teachers of record – proof the district is committed to giving EL students the same high-quality education that their peers, whose primary language is English, receive.





Lutheran spoiled Beech Grove's return to "The Pit," the Hornets first game in the stadium since October 1975, with a dominating second half for a 66-35 triumph in the 2020 opener.

Seating in "The Pit" was restricted due to COVID-19 restrictions. Some fans brought their lawn chairs and sat beyond the south endzone while others stood outside the fence on Main and 13th streets to get a long-range view of the Indiana Crossroads Conference contest. Big plays – seven touchdowns of more than 60 yards each – a

blocked punt for a 10-yard TD by Hayden Filipovich, and a dominating passing game by Lutheran of nearly 300 yards accounted for a thrill-a-

The two teams combined for the highest scoring game in "The Pit" by one point; the previous record was 80 points in BG's 58-22 win against University High School in Bloomington in 1971.

Leading 23-14, Filipovich broke through the BG line untouched, blocked a Hornet punt and romped a few short yards for a 31-14 lead with 10:25 left in the second quarter.

"That was the plan from the beginning to go right up the middle," Filipovich recalled. "We started rough and it was tough to get going; but once we started clicking, it was exciting."

Beech Grove retaliated later with a 67-yard drive, capped by quarterback Gavin Mitchell's 13-yard run with 2:50 left in the first half to cut the lead to 31-28. A minute later, Beech Grove's Jaden Mullins recovered a Lutheran fumble after a 17-yard pass completion, but the ensuing drive ended near midfield.

In the second half, two TD passes from guarterback Blake White to receiver Montasi Clay broke the rivalry game wide open. The senior receiver scored first on a "missile" play for 64 yards that was installed last year for him. The second TD was a 69-yard screen pass for a commanding 45-28 lead.

"We pulled 'missile' out of the bag because the run game wasn't working," Clay said. "At halftime, we made up a play (second TD) with curls, stop and go and I hit up the middle and was gone. We got every ing situated on defense at halftime and went on to win.

The Saints expanded their lead by scoring on a short pass from White to Joe Faubion, a 23-yard run by White and a 66-yard run by

"It was great to see all our guys keep their composure all the game,' defensive lineman Filipovich said "Even when it was close, we kept our composure and we were always able to score again." Both teams combined for more that 800 yards on offense. White completed

18 of 24 passes for 289 yards and four TDs, while Mitchell had a combined 332 yards passing and rushing and threw for three TDs. In another Southside rivalry, host

Franklin Central defeated Perry Meridian, 40-14, as quarterback Collin Badgero threw for 201 yards and a touchdown and Aataeveon Jordan ran for two scores. Teammate Josh Ruley gained 119 yards, also in 18 carries.

Greenwood used its trademark running game to come from behind and defeat visiting Bloomington North, 28-23, as Noah Apgar ran for 195 yards and four touchdowns and teammate Ethan Haessig added 153 yards. Trailing 23-14 at halftime, Greenwood used ball control and limited the Cougars to only 10 offensive plays in the second

Center Grove jumped to a 42-7 halftime lead and coasted to a homefield 56-14 win over Decatur Central. The Trojans were led by three TDs by Conner Delp and two TDs by Carson Steele. Defensive lineman Caden Curry got the Troians started with a blocked punt recovery for the team's first score. (Note: Sports historian Jim Pich
