Merry Christmas

Christmas more than a miracle for Carver family

For Autumn and Zach Carver, Christmas is much more than giving presents.

It's all about giving thanks.

And the family from Franklin has more to be thankful for than anyone could know.

So much more.

They're thankful Autumn and baby Huxley are alive and well.

That's because they survived the Covid 19 crisis, when so many people were

According to the World Health Organization, the disease has afflicted more than 100 million people in the United States, and it has killed more than a million of them.

That it did not take Autumn and Huxley is considered a miracle by the Carver family. "We're super

blessed," said Zach Carver. "The good Lord is looking out for us." "This certainly gives us a different outlook, not only on the holiday season,

but every day," said Autumn. Those who helped keep the family going will be present at Christmas.

"We spend Christmas eve with my family," said Zach, the son of Tony and Anita Carver. "I have younger brothers who are married with kids of their own. We meet at our house for dinner. We also sponsor a family to help with the community.

"Christmas morning, we're with Autumn's parents (Chi and Robin Lau). This is the first time we'll have her parents and brother. We purchased a new home. We're having Christmas here. Autumn likes to host. We'll have a spread, I'm sure."

This day was a long time coming.

"We think about where we were a couple years ago," said Autumn. "We're thankful for where we are now and what could have been."

Autumn, then 35, was about to give birth to their third child in 2021 when she was struck down by Covid 19. Her case was severe enough that she was put on a ventilator and not expected to live.

Doctors performed an emergency Caesarian operation to deliver Huxley. Still, the odds appeared long.

We were told in Indianapolis that in 50 or 60 days, she was going to die," Zach said of Autumn's chances. "She did die several times, but they brought her back."

After starting her hospital stay on a ventilator, Autumn was clinging to life while hooked up to something called an "ECMO" machine. It's an extracorporeal membrane oxygenation machine, which takes the blood, removes carbon dioxide and replaces it with oxygen before returning it.

Still, those odds remained long. Until the first break came their way.

"Long story short, a gentleman who Autumn works for (at Northwestern Mutual) had clients, some in Chicago," said Zach. One of them was Dr. Ankit Bharat, the chief of thoracic surgery at Northwestern Memorial Hospital in Chicago.

'It was not the best experience in Indianapolis, so we were anxious to get to that hospital," Zach continued.

"Dr. Bharat was already famous. He had

done the most Covid lung transplants in the world, all successfully. Dr. Bharat said get her here as soon as we can."

They were hoping he could do a lung transplant for Autumn. "He said regardless of a lung transplant or not, she was going to be

fine. That was very exciting for us," Zach said. Dr. Bharat said even so, the odds remained frightful.

"When we took on Autumn, the probability was pretty low that she would get better because she had been on a ventilator and ECMO for an extended period of time," he told People Magazine. But Autumn slowly recovered, and did not need a lung transplant.

"Dr. Bharat was amazing; the whole staff was amazing," Zach said. "He helped save her life, no doubt."

That's just one part of the story.

Autumn was first hospitalized in late August. After the C-section, she did not see Huxley again until Oct. 19.

"It was pretty amazing!" Zach said of the emotional reunion that day. "The doctor said we can bring our son into the room. My mother-in-law was in tears. There wasn't a dry eye in the ECU. It was much needed."

"I remember that day; I remember the excitement in the staff," Autumn said. "They were taking me out of isolation. Everybody was buzzing around, excited. I didn't have a lot of strength. So I held him for a bit. That wore me out pretty quickly. Mom laid the baby on a blanket on me. He snuggled up and went to sleep. I'll never forget

Autumn kept improving so much that she was released from intensive care. She was then transferred to the Shirley Ryan AbilityLab in Chicago for rehabilitation.

Cunningham, Hawk boys run past Pioneers

Size, speed, pressure defense and 3-point baskets.

It was all too much for Mooresville, as Decatur Central's boys led from start to finish in Friday's Mid-State Conference clash, topping the Pioneers 65-39 in the second half of the girl-boy doubleheader in the Curry Center Gymnasium.

Led by Melakih Cunningham, three Hawks scored in double figures as the Hawks won their conference opener and improved to 3-1 overall.

Cunningham, a 6-5 junior, hit five two-point baskets. knocked down three of the Hawks' eight 3-pointers and added

"We knew we had to come out stronger, since it's a rivalry ballgame," he said. "We know if we share the ball, they can't guard just one of us."

Nash Sigmund, a 5-11 freshman, scored all 12 of his points on four 3-pointers, all after intermission.

"I come in with Nash, and we shoot every morning," Cunningham noted. "We shot this morning, too."

Ty'reese Burnett hit the other 3-pointer, knocked down three twos and added a free throw for 10 points. Eric Hopson and Antawn Price scored six each on three field goals. KC Berry, in foul trouble throughout, finished with five before fouling out. Alec Surber added four points on two field goals.

'That was a huge win; a huge win," said DC coach Alec Surber. "It's nice to get off to a good start on the road. We've played well here. We had patience offensively, moving the

And they have that pressure defense.

"That's what our emphasis was – be good defensively, keep them from doing what they do," Surber said. "They've bought into playing defense.

"Our speed and length also gave them issues." It did that.

"Twenty-two turnovers, and many of them were picksixes," said Pioneer coach Shabaz Khaliq. "You're not going to win many games that way. We got destroyed in the first half

"They're senior laden, but their senior leader (Berry) was in foul trouble. We have no excuse.'

Chris Thompson, who hit three 3-pointers, and Brevon Burns led the Pioneers, 1-1 in MSC play and 2-4 overall, by scoring nine points each. 12 Jayce Nielsen added eight.

"I don't have a problem with getting beat," said Khaliq. "But we're losing games. That's something we've got to do we've got to get better."

Cunningham said the Hawks plan to stay better. "Our goal is to win the conference," he said.

After traveling to Ritter on Dec. 19, the Hawks host Franklin in a Dec. 22 MSC contest. They then compete in the Dec. 27 New Castle tournament, playing Norwell at noon. The consolation game starts at 5:30 and the championship game at

Last Friday. Lvn and I attended the Franciscan Health Senior Promise Christmas Party. We have done this a few times and it is always very nice. Lyn's sister-in-law Jean and some of her friends were also with us.

The lunch was delicious. They had lots of door prizes. Jeanie won four tickets to Conner Prairie that includes a hot air balloon ride. Lyn won a beautiful potted plant.

After lunch, the guest speaker was introduced. Hal Blank is the

CEO and a pilot for Grace On Wings.
Grace On Wings is a non-profit public charity organization under IRS code 501(c)(3) that provides charity air ambulance services within the United States. Grace on Wings was founded in 2006 when a group of volunteers responded to a call that could save lives. Since then, the ministry has served many patients and families in crisis.

Hal explained a lot about how he discovered the need and then how difficult it was to get properly licensed and able to meet all the requirements of the medical and aviation rules and guidelines.

. He explained that they were providing an airplane/ambulance. An example might be if someone from Indianapolis was on vacation in Florida and suffered a stroke or heart attack. They would be given good care at a local hospital. Once they are released from the hospital, they will need more assistance in returning to Indianapolis. Grace On Wings provides an airplane and proper medical assistance for the trip.

This is the only non-profit air/ ambulance service in the United States. The costs for each flight are carefully explained to the family and the families can use several ways to get donations and support to cover the costs of the flight.

Hal told us that Grace On Wings had an office and their plane was housed at The Indianapolis Municipal Airport. At some point, the rent increased, and he began looking for another location. Their office is now located at 5128 E. Stop 11 Road and their airplane is now at The Indy South Greenwood Airport. I was very surprised to find out that this special service was located in our backyards.

We learned that almost every flight is different based on the needs of the patient. A person that was in a bad accident and suffered burns and broken bones would need different assistance than someone that suffered a stroke or had heart problems. Many times, when a young child is the patient, parents are also traveling with

Grace on Wings has a website and also has a Facebook account. There is a lot more information available. I read on the website that they have completed over seven hundred missions and traveled over one million miles.

During the part of his presentation, folks could ask questions, a lady asked what the longest trip was they had flown with a patient on-board. Hal explained that it was a flight from Daytona Beach, Florida to Seattle, Washington. They had to stop to refuel a couple

As I listened to him explaining that long trip, it occurred to me that they also flew from Indianapolis to Daytona Beach and later from Seattle back to Indianapolis.

All the folks at the Christmas Party seemed to be very impressed and pleased to welcome Mr. Hal Blank and his Grace On

header in the Curry Center Gymnasium. Rachel Harshman scored 24 points and Kalyn Bunch 16 to lead the Pioneers, 12-2, to their eighth straight win. They're 4-0 in Mid-

State Conference play. For Decatur Central, Kenadi Passley-Banks scored 12 points, Souria Gouard 10 and Kassandra McMasters 8, but that slow start proved costly for the Hawks, now 2-2 in the Mid-State and 5-7

Mooresville led 32-19 at the half and 50-40 after three quarters. In that, Carothers saw hope.

"We had some good shots to end the quarters," he said. "It's all good. We got it down to four there. We've just got to make more shots. We had good looks, we had good shots. It's all good."

Mooresville coach Mark Hurt said a fast start was instrumental "We got off to a really good start," he said. "They have a good team. Defensively, we did a good job keeping them in front of us. "With Rachel (6-0), Kalyn (Bunch, 6-0) and Randee (Garringer, 6-1), we had a size advantage. We were getting the ball inside,

either scoring or getting to the free-throw line. DC actually won the middle quarters 38-35 as Passley-Banks hit all of her 3-pointers.

Passley-Banks scored all her points on four 3-point baskets. Gouard hit three two-pointers, one 3 and converted one of two free throws. McMasters had two baskets and four free throws. Havana Thompson had three field goals and a free throw for seven points, Mia Barnes had one 3, one two and five points, Nevaeh Hearn

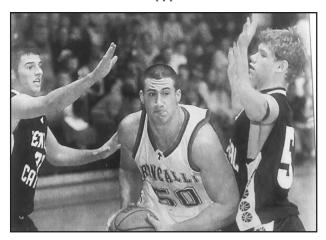
