A long line of men, women and children had gathered for an opportunity o receive household goods for their family. One could have easily mistaken it as a scene out of a movie. Cars parked on each side of the street made it difficult for anyone coming to the Kreative Kompassion goods distribution event, but persistence prevailed for people who waited patiently. These families depend on the generosity of Kreative Kompassion CEO Rachael Kesecker noted these events make

it possible for families in

need. "We will supply these families with daily essentials if they are willing to wait in this line.

On this particular Saturday morning, more than 75 people had gathered at the facility in Greenwood, one and a half hours before Kreative Kompassion even opened its doors. The line doubled in size before the doors opened. "I have never seen so many people lined up this early," Kesecker told The Southsider Voice.

The idea to help feed those who need food originated when the Keseckers were helping a local church with its distribution. Kesecker said, "We felt that we could take this distribution to another level. We decided to start this non-profit organization.'

Kreative Kompassion launched in the Spring of 2019 to provide services to those in need locally.

Distribution events are announced via social media. People must sign up in advance to receive goods that include food, personal hygiene items, cleaning products and more. A pool of 150 volunteers are available to help at distribution events; a minimum of 15 volunteers are required for each distribution event.

Kreative Kompassion made its imprint in the community through various projects last year. For example, it assisted the Red Cross Shelter after the tornado in Whiteland by supplying small toys for kids that visited the shelter last April. Several weeks later, it provided a week's supply of ready-made food for tornado victims.

When Kreative Kompassion started this mission, the operational cost for one distribution was \$1,300. Today, the cost is now \$3,250 to put on

a distribution event. Kesecker added "We required one semi-load of goods to assist those in need when we started in 2019. Today, we now require two semi-loads of goods to make this successful." One instance Kreative Kompassion stepped up to help those in need was when a business closed its doors forever in August of 2023. "Employees did not get paid for their last two weeks of work, so we organized a distribution event for the employees. They had to show their (Yellow Freight) IDs to be able to get the food,

### Loss of friends with Edgewood ties

I am a member of the Perry Township / Southport Historical Society. I have been a member for several years and serve on the board of directors. I have assisted in putting together and presenting a few programs.

I helped with a wonderful program about the Longacre Pool and Park and a few years later a program that remembered and honored folks from Perry Township that participated in the Indianapolis 500 Race over the years.

In 2019, we started a basketball hall of fame that is based on two blocks of Epler Avenue. It involved Epler Avenue from Madison Avenue for a couple of blocks to the west. We have a couple of various locations where we can draw candidates.

Edgewood Grade School students or staff, players of Edgewood Grade School outside basketball courts or ties to Kautsky's Grocery Store. Frank Kautsky started the very first professional basketball team based in Indiana.

The seven inductees were Paul L. Bailey, Frank Kautsky, Oral Hillebrand, Louie Dampier, Steve Downing, George McGinnis, and Pat Williams. Sadly, we have lost a couple of these in the last few months. George McGinnis passed in December 2023, and we just lost Pat Williams a couple of weeks ago.

Because of the Covid pandemic, we have not put together a second induction. We are planning one in a few months. I have been working on the list of candidates. A candidate must have a basketball connection in these two blocks and earn money later by coaching, playing, or officiating.

A few days ago, I received a telephone call from one of the candidates. It surprised me because hardly anyone but me knew of the upcoming induction. Jesse Blackwell was a student at Edgewood Grade School and Southport High School. He was a wonderful basketball player. He went on to Butler University and played for Tony Hinkle. Jesse is a retired teacher and coach.

He was calling me to get my address. He found some magazines that he thought I might find interesting. I got to tell him that a second induction was in the works, and he was on the list. I keep thinking of the odds of one of the guys on that list to surprise me with a phone call.

Others on our list of candidates includes the Van Arsdale brothers, John Wooden, Branch McCracken, Stretch Murphy, Everett Swank, Jewell Young and Fred Fechtman.

We will be posting the list and the date of the program soon. The historical society is also putting together a program to recognize and honor Perry Township School Bus drivers from the 40's, 50's and 60's. I am making a list of the school bus numbers and we are placing driver's names that connect with those bus numbers. An example is Bus #12 Norwood Epler.

A couple of weeks ago, David Ladd posted on the Southport High School Alumni Facebook page that he was looking for members who remember their school bus driver. The last time I looked, 160 members had responded.

I spoke to David on the telephone, and we are going to share some of this information. In the future, this should become a remarkably interesting and special program.

Her visit was part of GCA's dedication and celebration of its first on-campus library and an open house that displayed student artwork and provided performances by school choirs in the auditorium where refreshments were served.

However, the main attraction was the first-ever school library in a second-floor room that served as the weight training room for high school studentathletes until that part of GCA was moved in 2021 to a northern campus next door to the Community Church of Green-

wood on West Main Street. Former teacher JoEllen Weems was a catalyst for the library and called upon Greenwood Public Library, several Southside businesses, and dozens of volunteers to put together the 6.000-book library for students in kindergarten through eighth grade at the south campus at 835 West Worthsville Road.

Heretofore, teachers had some books available for students to read in their classroom, but there was no library.

This library was two years in the making; it took many volunteers and community support," Weems said. "There really was no space for any library until the high school was moved. We are very blessed to have this completed."

Weems expressed her appreciation to Greenwood Public Library personnel who assisted in categorizing books, book fairs that were held where patrons could purchase books for the library, library shelving from the old Clark-Pleasant branch library became available, utility JCREMC donated \$6,500 in grants and former McDonald's franchise owners Pete and Melissa Wojtowicz also donated a grant.

The celebration included a short dedication attended by parents and friends in the main gymnasium where Greenwood Public Library and Johnson County libraries had information available along with books that were available to be autographed by Pence. GPL's mascot "Fable" also greeted the children.


"To see this dream become a reality is a beacon of hope and life in our community," GCA board member Stephanie Schilling praised.

Patrick graduated from Southport High School in 1971 and was a standout basketball player. He furthered his education from Hanover College and Indiana University. He taught and coached in Indiana, Kentucky and Nevada and at Hanover and Earlham colleges. For more than 30 years he was the founder and director of Pistol Pat Basketball Camps (still operating) that were held throughout the United States and internationally.

Throughout his career, Pat received

several awards including inductions into the Hanover College Hall of Fame, Southport High School Hall of Fame, the Kentucky Colonel Award and the latest, induction into the Edgewood-Epler-Kaustsky Hall of Fame, presented by the Southport/Perry Township Historical Society.

He was a Hanover College All-Conference basketball player and got to participate in the Indiana college all-star game. Pat was preceded in death by his father Harry Williams Sr., mother Geraldine (Havely) Williams White; siblings Mike Williams and Sandy Williams Horton.





# **Full force GCA sends defending** state champion Saints to sideline

When Greenwood Christian Academy's boys' basketball team began its sectional week practices Feb. 26, Cougars head coach Jackson Williams could not believe his eyes.

For the first time since early December, all his Cougars were healthy. Williams' chargers finally had overcome a list of injuries that resulted in mix-and-match lineups while building a 14-7 regular season record.

The injuries were to backcourt aces: juniors Evan McIntire (broken leg) and Ben Comerford (stress fracture) and seniors Jordan Taulman (ankle) and Max Booher (hip). For sure, there were some games

that the Cougars lost because of injuries. But the real payoff provided other Cougars with more in-season minutes, and that proved so valuable Saturday as GCA ended the Saints reign Saturday by winning the Class A Lutheran Sectional, 49-46. "We showed depth and that's something we

haven't had most of the season," third-year coach Williams said afterward. "This is the first time we've had a full team healthy for a long time. It (depth) helped us tonight."

Leading 47-46, Booher canned two free throws with 17.7 seconds left in the game. Lutheran called time-out but missed on an air-ball shot that was

caught by a teammate too late for another shot. The final buzzer touched off a celebration and trophy presentation that had been three years in the making. Two years ago, Lutheran defeated GCA (48-41) and last year edged the Cougars (61-57) in sectional title games as the Saints continued their drive to the program's first Class A state championship

"We've been waiting three years for this one," said Booher who led the Cougars with 17 points and was the first to climb the ladder and cut down part of the net. "We wanted to make sure our defense contained LJ (Ward) and didn't let him go off on us. We knew we had to contain him. Ward scored 26 points that included five earth-

shaking dunks Friday for the Cougars

against Tindley. With 1:19 left in the title game Saturday, Ward stole the ball and scored on a lay-up as the Saints closed to 46-45. The Saints final point came on a free throw by 6-8 junior Rai'Shaun McHenry with 31 seconds left. Cougars coach Williams reviewed the

keys to victory.

We wanted to be able to handle their defensive pressure because they are so quick and can really jump out on you on defense," Williams said. "Then we wanted to compete and win the glass (rebounds). And we wanted to guard them and keep them in front of us.

Williams also added, "We certainly didn't want them to go on big runs."

The Cougars played the way their coaches wanted. Trailing 17-11, the Cougars went on an 8-0 run that was capped by McIntire's 3-point shot in the second quarter. GCA led 26-21 at the half as the Saints were plagued by poor free throw shooting, hitting only 1 of 7 charity tosses. The Saints closed the first half dan-gerously on a theft and lay-up by DeVuan Jones before the buzzer. The two teams traded the lead four times in the second half before Taulman canned a

3-point shot for a 35-33 lead. Noah Reed's field goal gave the Cougars a 46-40 lead that prompted their fans to chant "I believe we're going to win" with 2:36 to go. It wasn't that easy as the Saints twice cut the margin to one point but never led down the stretch.


GCA's McIntire added 17 points, and Reed contributed 8 points to help lead the Cougars. Ward led the Saints with 15 points and TJ Clark added 9 points. The two teams battled evenly on the boards.

GCA reached the sectional finale by dominating Providence Cristo Rey 61-12 and Cen-tral Christian 58-21. Lutheran defeated Victory College Prep 88-41 and upended Tindley 68-41 after holding the explosive Tigers to only four points in the first quarter.

Lutheran's high-flying Ward electrified the home crowd with his variety of massive dunks, all in the Saints' dynamic fourth quarter, as the 5-11 junior surpassed the 1,000-point career mark

"They (Tindley) talk a lot, but we've never lost to them," Ward said of the spirited rivalry. "We took this game as real personal. We don't want to lose at home."

Those last words echoed Saturday night as the Saints never got on a big run on their home court against the Cougars. Lutheran finishes 15-9. They graduate five seniors but expect to return with Ward, McHenry, Jones, Cayden Loescher, and TJ Clark for a solid nucleus.


In the stepladder, Heldman barely edged Jones, 193-189, but fell to eventual state runner-up Edwards, 203-181
