Herman Bueno was recently honored for all his accomplishments over his long career at Southport Middle School. Bueno was honored for being a science teacher, as well as a track and cross-country coach. Bueno spent over 25 years as a teacher for Southport and graduated from Southport himself in

Southport himself in 1976. During his time as a student at Southport High School, Bueno was an exceptional runner. He held the school's records for distance events in cross country and track for nearly 40 years.

After graduating high school, Bueno went on

Hathaway's harriers worked morning and night to reach for a dream they thought was possible.

And sure enough they did. Taking first in the sectionals and regional wasn't enought for the Cardinal crew as they rabled on to capture the trophy along with the glory of a state championship. Herman Bueno, Erhard Bell, David Kays and Kurt Hurley, the four horsemen, placed high enough along with junior Jim Booher beat a surprised Crown Point team which took second place honors. Sophomore Bob Browne and junior Kent Raker rounded out the seven-man punch.

The Harriers dual meet record was 8-0 including a 17-47 romp over archrival Perry Meridian for the all-sports trophy. The Cardinals also won three invitations; the Pike Hokum Koren, Ben Davis invitational and the Howe linvite. They also displayed their pack in the county as they took that convincingly. Coach Hathaway starts his train-

coach hatnaway starts his training program in the summer with a thousand-mile club starting in June. To obtain a shirt a runner has to run 500 miles before practice Aug. 13 so that he will have 1000 miles between June and September. Seniors Herman Bueno and Erhard Bell ran 900 miles. to run cross country and track at the University of Indianapolis. During this time at UIndy, Bueno received numerous awards. He was a four-time Letter-winner in both cross-country and track and field, and four-time Cross Country MVP honoree. In 1977 and 1978, Bueno was two-time NCAA Track and Field National Qualifier; as well as two-time HCC Cross Country Outstanding Runner and twotime NCAA Cross Country National Qualifier in 1978 and 1979. In 1980, Bueno was the HCC Track and Field's Most Valuable Runner. These are just a few of Bueno's many accomplishments as a college athlete.

In his career after college, Bueno coached several undefeated teams at Southport Middle School with career winning records of over 80 percent. He was inducted into the Southport High School Wall of Fame in 2004 and was University of Indianapolis Greyhound Club's 'I' Person of the year honoree in 2006. The event to celebrate Coach Bueno's career was held last Saturday at Southport Middle School. Many past students and runners, as well as work colleagues came to show their support, congratulate, and thank Bueno for his dedication to his job as teacher and coach.

Bueno has also been an assistant and teacher at the Marc Adams School of Woodworking and Time-Honored Crafts since it opened in 1993. He has assisted in over 80 classes over the years and attended many classes himself. Bueno has dedicated his life to helping both students and adults grow and learn. His dedication shows through the success of his countless students.







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Saints' comeback against Lions helps pave way to Gainbridge Fieldhouse

A comeback for the ages propelled underdog Lutheran over Loogootee and that same defensive intensity against Rock Creek Academy produced the Saints' first IHSAA Semistate championship Saturday since 2008 at Washington.

The Saints (19-7) advance to the IHSAA Class A state championship game against unranked Southwood (15-12) at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in Gainbridge Fieldhouse. Lutheran is seeking the program's first state title, having lost their only previous trip in 2008 to Triton.

"Defense and fearless" were the words that Lutheran coach Remus Woods used to describe the 2022-2023 Saints.

They lived up to those words in the final minutes Saturday morning against No. 4 Loogootee. Trailing by 10 points with very few minutes left, the No. 8 Saints ratcheted up their defensive intensity. They trimmed the lead in half within 40 seconds.

"It was desperation at that point," Woods later recalled.

The winning points came on a 3-pointer by sharpshooting senior Durray Smith and lavup by sophomore Cavden Loescher, whose late-season improvement has sparked the

Saints' drive. The final count was:

Lutheran 67, Loogootee 66. A last-second three-quarter shot by LJ Ward was waved off by officials

Smith had a team-high 16 points on five of 12 3-pointers with Kam Patterson adding 14 points and six rebounds, and Loescher 11 points. Ward had five rebounds and four steals.

Between games, the Saints stayed at nearby Barr-Reeve High School where they rested, ate and had a short shootaround before returning to Washington's famed Hatchet House

The Saints never trailed in the nightcap in defeating a much taller Rock Creek team, 55-47

The quick-handed Saints had 16 steals in the nightcap Loescher led with 14 points and eight rebounds. Smith added 11 points and senior Aiden Alialy grabbed five rebounds. "Our kids really got after it,"

Woods said

The fourth-year coach continued, "We play tough opponents during the season and that prepares us for the playoffs.



Lutheran's Kam Patterson (5) drives against Loogootee in Class A semifinal opener at Washington High School in southern Indiana.




Cayden Loescher (10) scores as the Lutheran bench and crowd roars in closely fought win by the Saints, 67-66 against Loogootee Saturdav.

Lutheran backcourt ace LJ Ward (11) goes hard to the basket against Loogootee. Ward's defensive presence helped Saints come from behind against the Lions



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



Sweet 16 Contest attracts advertisers in unpredictable tourney without I.U., Purdue

Of all the millions of brackets entered in ESPN's perfect bracket contest, there are no perfect brackets left in the men's basketball tournament. However, on the Southside, 16 businesses that advertise in The Southsider Voice could be winners because they are entered in a Sweet 16 Contest.

Some businesses, depending upon how their drawn teams do in the tourney, will win free ads.

This has been an unpredictable tourney.

No. 16 Fairleigh Dickinson University, known as FDU, shocked No. 1 Purdue, becoming only the second 16-seed to beat a No. 1-seed in the tourney. FDU fell to C-USA champion Florida Atlantic University, coached by former Indiana University student manager Dusty May, 78-70 Sunday

Seven high seeds are out of the running, No. 1 Kansas and Purdue, No. 2 Arizona and Marquette, No. 3 Baylor, and No. 4 Virginia and I.U.

I.U. took care of business in its late-night tourney opener Friday by downing Kent State, 71-60. Center Grove product Trayce Jackson-Davis added to his resume with 24 points, 11 rebounds, five blocks, and five assists. Senior forward Race Thomson added 20 points.

The resurgent Hoosiers made it to the second round for the first time since 2016 and the fifth time since 2008. Sunday I.U. ran into a quicker and sharper Miami (Fla.) Hurricanes that opened with a ragged win against Drake. I.U. had difficulty in keeping up with the speedy and aggressive 'Canes. 85-69

The tournament traditionally settles down in the Sweet 16 with fewer upsets as the No. 1 (Alabama and Houston) and No. 2 seeds (Texas and UCLA) advance. Eleven conferences are represented in the Sweet 16, including three from the Big East and SEC.

East and West Regionals are Thursday and Saturday; South and Midwest Regionals are Friday and Sunday.







In previous games, the Hornets have battled back no matter what.


But all those early fouls mounted up. So much so, that Guerin found itself shooting double-bonus free throws with 2:39 remaining in the third quarter.

Dreyer Reinbold drivers big part of buzz about Indy 500 in May

Multiple-motorsports team owner Dennis Reinbold was in California recently for the championship rounds of the NRX **Rallycross Series** for FCI-S all-electric vehicles. No worries

if that alphabet soup is confusing because the topic out West also turned to the two Dreyer Reinbold Racing (DRR) entries in the 107th Indianapolis 500 with drivers Stefan Wilson and 2014 Indianapolis 500 winner Ryan Hunter-Reay.

Hunter-Reav was announced last week, but Wilson was with Reinbold, who owns an auto dealership in Greenwood at the

Rallycross event in California and took time for an exclusive interview with The Southsider Voice.

Obviously, the "500' was a big part of the buzz during the NRX Rallycross Series.

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Wilson and Reinbold are ecstatic that Hunter-Reay is on board. Wilson and the 500 winner were teammates in 2015 and 2021 with a different team.

"It's good to have that relationship with Ryan," said Wilson, brother of the late Justin Wilson who was fatally injured in an IndyCar race at Pocono in 2015. "Our setups are similar. His past experience will be a big team asset."

Reinbold landed Hunter-Reay after the Floridian driver had visited the Dreyer-Reinbold race shop several times on Indy's northside.

"He (Ryan) has a comfort level after seeing our shop and realizing that being in a 500-only mode makes us well-prepared; Ryan was impressed," Reinbold said. "He's a proven winner at the Speedway and a tremendously talented driver.'

Hunter-Reay joins former 500 winners Al Unser Jr., Buddy Lazier, and Buddy Rice among the 45 previous DRR drivers since 2000. And he returns to Chevrolet power which he utilized in winning the 2012 Indy Car Series.

After a 12-year run with Andretti Autosport and longtime DHL backing, Formula One veteran Romain Grosjean inherited that seat. Without a ride in 2021, Hunter-Reay coached Hollinger Racing rook Callum llott for last year's 500. In three of his last four starts for Andretti, Hunter-Reay finished fifth, eighth and

However, Hunter-Reay, 42, vowed that he would return to the 500 in a competitive ride.

After a year's absence from the "500," Hunter-Reay admits that he is once-again "laser-focused and energized" with DRR and that "the Indy 500 isn't just a motor race, for me; it's a way

"DRR is a streamlined program that puts all its energy into the month of May," Hunter-Reay stated in a news release last week. "I guess you can say I'm going back to my roots, considering how I started my IndyCar career with smaller teams that took the fight to the bigger efforts and won. If you look at DRR's record at Indy and their impressive recent results, the pool of talented engineers and crew; it's a perfect fit."

The entry for Hunter-Reay is the 33rd entry for the upcoming May 28 classic.

DRR consistently has fielded entries that have finished among the top 10, including fourth place in 2012 with Oriol Servia, seventh with Sage Karam in 2021, and 10th with Santino Ferrucci last year.

Hunter-Reay is assigned the No. 23 DRR entry with Wilson in the No. 24 joint DRR entry with Cusick Motorsports. Wilson's best "500" finish is 15th in 2018 after leading with only four laps to go
