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'500' practice begins with feuds, Power drought, **Ganassi team momentum**

Some NTT IndyCar Series drivers are feuding, 2018 Indianapolis 500 winner Will lower remains winless in series since June 2022, and the Chip Ganassi Racing team has momentum in the aftermath Saturday of the Sonsio Grand Prix at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

With practice under way this week for the 108th running of the Indianapolis 500, the emphasis shifts from the IMS road course to the world famous 2.5mile oval, home of the Greatest Spectacle in Racing.

The feud between A.I. Foyt team driver Santino Ferrucci and Juncos Hollinger's Romain Grosjean, survivor of a fiery death-defying Formula One crash in 2020 at Bahrain, brought their argument to the Speedway from a pit lane incident at Barber Motorsports Park last month.

They banged wheels again Saturday morning in pit lane during a brief warmup session for the IMS road course race. This time. Ferrucci gave Grosjean a one-finger salute.

Later, Grosjean brushed the budding rivalry aside.

Not so much for the fiery Ferrucci who said, "This isn't Formula One racing. I had the corner, and if he doesn't like it, he can come to me."

Ferrucci continued, "Man. he drove me at Barber in the warmup for no reason. I'm simply returning the favor ... He doesn't like it, then come over here and talk to me about it.'

After a wild moment in the road course race, two Andretti drivers - Colton Herta and Marcus Ericsson - were at odds after a collision that sent Herta's Honda through a gravel trap. Herta, who went into the event as the series leader, had a few words afterward for his teammate.

Herta recovered and finished seventh after starting 24th; Ericsson finished 18th; Grosjean, who was run off the course twice, soldiered to 12th place after starting 23rd; and Ferrucci had the only race car that did not finish the race due a mechanical failure.

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
A Huey helicopter, like the ones used in Vietnam - this one from the American Huey 369 Museum in Peru - provided the pre-race flyover Saturday at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Herta trails two-time consecutive Sonsio Grand Prix winner Alex Palou by 25 points in fourth place, with the "500" looming ahead.

Power, a two-time series champion, finished second to Palou by 6.6 seconds Saturday after failing in his bid for the lead on the race's only caution and restart on lap 68.

Power, driver of the No. 12 Team Penske Verizon Chevrolet, pulled close to Palou into Turn 1, but was on the outside and could not make the pass.

"Just didn't quite have enough on that restart," Power

Power, winner of 41 IndyCar races, teamed with longtime engineer David Faustino, who doubled as his race strategist Saturday in the aftermath of a Team Penske reshuffling after announcing team suspensions earlier last week. Teammates Scott McLaughlin was sixth and reigning "500" winner Josef Newgarden was 17th.

Power said he expects the team assignments to remain the same at Indy for the rest of the month.

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Roncalli alum Sam Otley becomes Royals' new head football coach

Otley (Class of 2011) becomes the 11th head coach in the Royals prestigious football history that includes 10 state champion-

He has served as an assistant coach for eight seasons, including the past two seasons as offensive coordinator. He has been a running backs and offensive line coach. He was a coach on Roncalli's 4A state championship teams in 2016 and 2020 under

Indiana Football Hall of Fame coach Bruce Scifres. As a student-athlete at Roncalli, Otley was a four-year football player and was team captain his senior year and selected to the North-South All-Star Game. He is the oldest of five brothers who

played football and graduated from Roncalli. Otley was a student-athlete at Franklin College where he played football for four seasons. The Grizzly Cubs were four-time conference champions and advanced to the second round of the NCAA DIII playoffs for three seasons. He was team captain his senior

He also coached at Franklin College and North Carolina Wes-

Otley will teach advanced physical conditioning at Roncalli and work with the athletic department in managing the strength and

conditioning programs. With his Roncalli roots, the 31-year-old coach firmly believes he has benefitted from the teachings as a student-athlete at Roncalli.

"Roncalli is a special place that's had a significant impact on me throughout my life," Otley said in a news release. "It's an honor to lead the program as head coach."

Roncalli athletic director David Lauck stated, "He (Otley) is a Roncalli alumnus, understands and lives our mission and vision and

TLE T', WE MISS YOU

Several years ago, my wife, Lyn asked me to sit down because we needed to talk. This does not happen very often, and I am always a bit caught off guard each time. I had no clue what this discussion was going to be about.

We sat and she started explaining to me about our youngest grandson's girlfriend. They met at IUPUI where they were both students. She and her mother had relocated from Ecuador to Indiana. This had been a necessity for her mother. As I understood it, her mother's life had been threatened. She had been a practicing attorney in Ecuador.

Her mother needed to relocate to Atlanta, Georgia to find employment and her daughter was going to stay in Indianapolis to continue schooling at IUPUI. The young lady needed a place to stay. We had a spare bedroom.

Our grandson brought her down to our house for introductions and we hit it off quite well. Quickly, our spare bedroom was back in business. Between her classes and our grandson, we did not see her very much.

We seemed to get along great and were enjoying getting to know each other. I remember that she would sneak up behind me while I was sitting in my recliner and press the button on a small battery powered thing on the table beside my chair. When she pushed the button the thing announced, "That was Easy." I quickly gave her the nickname, "Little T." That is short for "Little Trouble."

She and our grandson quickly got engaged. Soon they were married and moved to Whiteland. We were incredibly happy for them. Lyn took the opportunity to convert our spare bedroom into her office, library, music room and lounge.

Unfortunately, their marriage did not last very long. Lyn listened to both sides of the story and spent time trying to help in any way we could. When it was positive that they were splitting up and they both needed to move out of the house, we took "Little T" back in

Our grandson brought all of her belongings to our house, and she was back. This time, because of Lyn's office, "Little T" needed to sleep on her air mattress in our family room. She had graduated from IUPUI and had a job.

During most mornings, I would need to get up and take care of our dog, Simon and our cat, Harry. Simon needed to have several teeth removed before we adopted him, and I always chopped up his dog food to make it easier for him to deal with.

Our kitchen and family room are remarkably close. I quickly discovered that the chopping sound was too much for "Little T' to continue sleeping. My thought was that it helped her get up and be to work on time.

She was with us for a few months and during that time she changed jobs. She then rented an apartment out in the Avon area that was close to her work. Things were going nicely.

All of a sudden, she was contacted by the US Immigration Department and was notified that she was being deported. I understood that she had a student visa and after graduation her marriage did not last long enough. She had several meetings to no avail.

She needed to be out of the country by the end of April. The company where she was employed had to let her go immediately. They told her that as soon as she could return with the proper paperwork, her job would be her's again.

Her mother and her uncle came up from Atlanta to assist her in this terrible move. "Little T" is now again in Ecuador. She will be there a few months and then moving to Spain. She will be attending college in Spain to get her masters.

Hopefully, she will get a new visa and be able to return to the

United States. We really miss her.
I purchased her a new cassette tape player and recorded the sound of me chopping Simon's breakfast. It might help her wake up and get to school on time.



Within less than a year, the landscape of Southside softball has changed on the eve of the 2024 IHSAA


The field of teams (and dreams) is tighter than in previous years when Roncalli dominated Class 4A with two consecutive state championships and a third straight title game appearance.


Armstrong.

Beech Grove City Schools Supt. Laura Hammack outlined changes at Central Elementary and South Grove Intermediate schools for the 2024-2025 school year.

She also praised Beech Grove Middle School teachers and staff for being named by the National Institute for Excellence in Teaching (NIET) as its 2024 School of Promise during her remarks Thursday at the monthly Greater Beech Grove Chamber of Commerce luncheon.

Hammack, in her third annual State of Beech Grove City Schools address, said that grade levels at Central and South Grove schools would undergo

changes. Central Elementary will become Central Intermediate School for grades 5 and 6 only, and South Grove would become South Grove Elementary School for grades 2 through 4.

The changes, Hammack explained, are being made due to student enrollments and classroom space.

Also, high school principal Andrew Karr will move to the intermediate school. and Brown County school principal Trent Austin, a 27year school administrator, becomes the new BGHS principal, effective July 1. A new principal at South Grove Elementary School is being sought.

Hammack said that the total enrollment is 2,750 students for Beech Grove schools this year, but future trends show a slight decrease in student population, a phenomenon also anticipated throughout Marion County and Indianapolis Public Schools.

Hammack also pointed out that BGCS administra-

Hammack also explained the success of the district's motto "Love Where you Learn."

She said that extends to love of belonging, community, growth, diversity, and learning.

"We hold true to our vision that education can change the world," Hammack said. "We hold the highest expectations for all students. Upon graduation, they are ready for college, the workforce, or the military."

Hammack also acknowledged BGMS art teacher Jonee Sutton as a top-10 finalist for 2024 Indiana Teacher of the Year.




