

OMS appoints **Edwards** as president-elect

One Mission Society (OMS), an international Christian mission organization based in Greenwood, announced the appointment of Dr. Jeffry Edwards as president-elect of the organization that serves 75 countries.

Edwards has been involved with OMS for more than 35 years and brings extensive experience into his new role.

He and wife Laura begin their new roles with OMS on July 1. He becomes the 11th president in OMS' 121-year history that has been intertwined with Greenwood since its world headquarters was established at 941 Fry Road more than 50 years ago. OMS previously was the Oriental Missionary Society but One

Mission Society provides the proper indentity for the worldwide mission. Edwards, an OMS missionary kid, grew up in Brazil, where he met his wife Laura and where they later served together for 22 years as OMS missionaries. Their ministry focus included church planting, leadership development, and counseling.

The couple also accepted positions as professors at Londrina Bible Seminary (LBS), where he served as the president of the LBS board for six years, and Laura directed two graduate programs in counseling.

After returning from South America, he invested 12 years serving as the OMS regional director for Latin America/Caribbean until June 2020 when he began his most recent role as the OMS Global Ministries executive director.

Bob Fetherlin, president of OMS for the past eight years, stated in a press release, "We wholeheartedly commend Jeff and his wife Laura. As he works in close collaboration with our board of trustees, signatory leaders, missionaries, and global partners, we're excited to see what God will do. We're convinced that amazing days of God using OMS for his purposes are ahead.

Edwards received a bachelor of arts in education (1986) from Asbury College; a master's degree in theological studies, with a concentration on church history (1992) from Wheaton College Graduate School; and a doctorate of ministry degree (2008) with an emphasis on pastoral care and counseling from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School.

One Mission Society is an evangelical, interdenominational faith mission, focusing on multiplying disciples, churches, leaders, and missionaries throughout Africa, Ásia/Pacific, Europe/Middle East, and Latin America/ Caribbean to make a global impact.

NEW BUSINESS ON THE SOUTHSIDE

Back in the days when I was a kid, most of the businesses that folks living on the Southside supported were owned by local folks. This was prior to the national organizations and even businesses with several locations in just

Indiana moving into our area. My father opened his ser-vice station located on Madison Avenue in 1956. I attended high school with many fellow students that had parents with local businesses. I'm so pleased to see that there are still local folks opening businesses on the Southside.

A few weeks ago, I received a call from Brad Epler. He introduced himself and explained that he was the son of Morris and Sandy Epler. I have known his parents for most of our lives. All three of us had families that

owned and operated service stations on the Southside.

I rode Norwood Epler's (Morris' dad) school bus for several years. The Epler family has a very strong connection with Perry Town-ship. The original large Epler home, located just west of the Edgewood Grade School property, on Epler Avenue, has been owned by Perry Township for years and housed the township offices.

Brad Epler explained to me that his son, Nathan, was in the process of opening a new fitness and muscle development facility on the Southside. He gave me Nate's number, so I called him and we made a plan to meet so I could learn more and see the facility.

The gym is located at 7747 Shelby Street. It is in a large strip mall on the east side of Shelby. I was very surprised at the size of his facility. I was told that this part of the mall had been sitting empty for about 10 years. It is about 23,000 square feet in size.

I sat down with Nate and he told me his story. He graduated from Greenwood High School in 2012. He was a wrestler in high school. He graduated from Ulndy in 2016 with a degree in Sports Manage-

ment and Business.

After he finished college, Nate became involved in competitive body building. He won his first event in Evansville in 2019, then began traveling the country and competing. He won in Chicago. Six weeks later, he won in Las Vegas. He was second in Indianapolis and won in New York.

In 2019 he competed in the world championship and finished fifth. Fifth in the World! This is the world championship competition in which Arnold Schwarzenegger used to compete.

He started training and coaching in 2019. He has been planning to open a facility of this type for several years. Nate explained to me that a good friend of his has partnered with him and they are excited to get things going. This talented fellow is 28 years old.

Author shares how faith helped her survive a medical mystery

What would you do if you discovered your food was slowly poisoning you? New Palestine resident Sarah Johnson spent 24 years fighting to solve her life-threatening medical mystery. Her journey to healing and to a deeper relationship with Jesus is recounted in her book "The Devil Inside Me Finding Jesus In A Life of Struggle."

Johnson, 45, will share her survival story of perseverance and faith when she holds a book signing event June 29 from 5 to 8 p.m. at Books & Brews South Indy, 3808 S. Shelby Street, Suite 1. "I wrote this book in the

sole interest of helping others who, like myself, have faced difficult and life-altering hardships," Johnson said. "I hope it will encourage someone to bravely keep fighting, even when they feel like giving up."

Johnson was a typical 19-yearold college freshman at Ball State University when she began experiencing a series of flu-like symptoms about 20 minutes after eating. Waves of nausea, clamminess, vomiting and a feeling of exhaustion would wrack her body. Sometimes the symptoms vanished within a few hours. Other times, the symptoms worsened, and she would feel intense pain just below her breastbone.

Soon Johnson dreaded every meal and developed a fear of eating. As a result, her weight plummeted, and her overall energy level and health declined. She went from doctor to doctor searching for answers, oftentimes being misdiagnosed.

Finally in 2018, a vascular doctor uncovered the real issue causing Johnson so much pain – superior mesenteric artery syndrome or SMAS, a rare digestive disorder. The first part of the small intestine is compressed between two arteries, the aorta and the superior mesenteric artery, causing a partial or complete blockage of the intestine.

"Essentially, eating certain foods was like trying to get a watermelon through a straw,"

Johnson said. "My body couldn't process food beyond that problem area the way most people can, and it caused my body to react in a strong way."


Knowing what was causing the problem was only half her journey. Her quest to find a surgeon qualified and willing to correct her condition became another battle. The surgery carries many risks, one of which includes death. During this time, Johnson turned to her Christian faith and began reading the Bible for strength and comfort.


"Reading scripture helped me mentally and emotionally. There were passages I found that made me feel more relaxed and reassured, and so as I continued my quest for healing, I developed a strong relationship with God," Johnson said. "This is why I wrote a Christian book. I wanted to give people the chance to grow their faith, even as small as a mustard seed (Matthew 17:20)."

She eventually found a doctor at Community North Indianapolis willing to do the surgery in September 2019. Johnson now finds herself on -yet another journey after her life-changing surgery – promoting her message of hope to many audiences. She has shared her experience at area churches, small-town libraries, and even a Christian-based podcast (Tell Me Your Testimony). "My life-altering experience

GREENWOOD'S BASS SLAMS WAY TO NAIA HONORS



Former Greenwood High School baseball standout TJ Bass is the first player in the history of Taylor University baseball to be named an NAIA first-team All-American. Bass also is the 2022 Crossroads League Player of the Year. Bass, a junior, destroyed the Taylor single-season record books, setting program records with 23 home runs and 94 runs batted in. 
UINDY CELEBRATES NCAA D2 LACROSSE TITLE




The Trojans wound up with 35.33 points; Plainfield captured the state title with 61 points.






